PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

TAKE PRIDE IN KERSEY PARISH

- A message from Kersey Parish Council:

Many of you that enjoy walking the footpaths of Kersey may have noticed that the steps at the allotments have been upgraded and improved for the benefit of all walkers. The gate and the post and rails have also been repaired, and all of this has been achieved due to a number of kind donations of equipment and importantly village residents giving up time to undertake the work. The footpath working group is working on a number of other areas to enhance the walking experience.





There has also been a noticeable improvement in the reduction of dog fouling on a number of the footpaths throughout the parish. Additional signs are being put into place and the PC is currently considering placing additional bins in position where dog walking is known to be at higher levels. The PC would like to thank all those individuals that have taken action to reduce the amount of dog waste on footpath walkways.

We still have improvements to be made, but if we can all continue to be vigilant when walking our beloved pets then all walkers will be able to enjoy the Kersey Parish at its best.

An extraordinary meeting of the Parish Council was held on the 5th November. Present were Chairman John Hume, five councillors, clerk and three members of the public.

Apologies received from one councillor.

Planning:

Sampsons Hall. Plans were shown for demolition of North East single storey wing and erection of extension and alterations. Three councillors had made a site visit which had proved helpful to understand the proposals. After discussion it was agreed to fully support this application.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES (cont.)

AOB:

Repairs to footpath 12 by the allotments had been completed. The footpath working group now plan to repair steps on path 16. Some damage had been caused to the bank and ditch near Ayres End.

An ordinary parish council meeting was held on the 19th November. Present was Chairman John Hume, all councillors, clerk, two members of the public and county and district councillors to give their reports. Before the agenda items the chairman thanked all those who had been involved with the services over the Remembrance and commented on the stunning display in church and also to those who had organised an entertaining quiz night.

Reports:

Babergh district councillor Alan Ferguson: Boundary Commission recommendations have been agreed. There will be a decrease in the number of councillors to thirty two. From May 2019, Lindsey and Chelsworth will join the current ward which includes Kersey and it will be known as South East Cosford. He reported that Babergh has a five year land supply. There would be no talks about the proposed merger between Babergh and Mid Suffolk before May 2019.

After newspaper reports about introducing car parking charges he said there was no reason why there should be a charge. Planning application for change of use and alterations at the Corks Lane site will go before the planning committee next month. Mr Ferguson said he was now back on the planning committee.

Following the council's move to Ipswich a facility is now available in Hadleigh Library every Thursday 1-5 when an officer will be in attendance to discuss planning issues or any other problems.

Finances were in a steady state. A member of the public asked about council tax payments on empty properties or holiday homes. Although this was a local problem it was government policy to charge a reduced rate or none at all.

County councillor Robert Lindsay spoke about the proposed cuts to a number of services, he was not in favour but at the moment he said they were only proposals and things could change.

Pot holes: All he could advise was to keep reporting them. A parish councillor brought up about "Road Closed" signs which are very misleading and are left in place long after work has been completed. He hoped this would improve in the future in the meantime he said report to the council.

Minutes of previous meeting held on the 5th November were signed.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES (cont.)

Clerks report:

No reply had been received about topping up the grit bins. As one of the proposed cuts by SCC was to road gritting this was a bit worrying.

The clerk had attended a session on GDPR.

Correspondence was noted.

Finance: All financial aspects were discussed.

Interim internal audit had been done and all was in order.

KCPC working group:

A maintenance morning had been held. The recent quiz had raised £751.

Footpath working group:

There were no issues with the paths at present. Entrance to the path by the allotments had been improved. Repair to the steps on Path 16 was the next project.

Dog bins were discussed and if more were purchased where they would be sited. Where signs have been erected about dog fouling these seem to be proving effective.

Homelessness:

Response to two consultations on Homelessness Reduction Strategy and Housing were discussed and a reply agreed. It was noted that in the housing document no mention was made on infrastructure.

Village Emergency Telephone System:

The clerk had been in touch with the Heartbeat Trust and progress was now being made.

Emergency plan: This was almost complete.

Kersey Volunteer Group:

Plans are all coming together, volunteers have been given their own specific area which they will be responsible for keeping clear of rubbish and to note potholes.

A moment when you look up from the bowl of plum duff your stirring; or wipe down the bar counter; or lock the door after visiting dear mother in Basingstoke.

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NEWS FROM KERSEY SCHOOL

Squirrels (Reception):

In Squirrels class we have been looking at celebrations and festivals around the world including: Bonfire Night and Diwali. Between now and Christmas we shall also be looking at Hanukkah and Christmas and why different religions celebrate these. We are also doing a nativity with Hedgehogs at the end of term called 'A Miracle in Town'.

Hedgehogs (Years 1 and 2):

Hedgehogs class have been learning about our topic 'Fire' and so far we have looked at 'The Gunpowder Plot' and we have been writing some brilliant poems about fireworks in literacy. In science the children have been investigating different types of materials and whether something is 'man-made' or 'natural'.

Badgers (Years 3 and 4):

As part of our Crime and Punishment topic this half term we have been researching lots of different time periods. So far we've learnt about the Tudors, the Georgians and the Romans! We are very thankful that the punishments that existed then do not exist now! In ICT we have used the gruesome story of Guy Fawkes to make our own stop art animation videos. Some of us were lucky enough to get them loaded onto YouTube for all the world to see. As part of Anti-Bullying week we have been learning a rap to remind how to define bullying and also stop it happening.

Owls (Years 5 and 6):

Owls class have spent the last few weeks learning about WW1 and the Armistice treaty. They have researched the lives of the two soldiers buried in St. Mary's church yard and presented this information to the congregation at our Remembrance service on 8th November. They thoroughly enjoyed finding out about these men and how they sacrificed their lives for their country. Many of the class have tales of tell of their own families who may have fought in the World Wars, which has brought home to them how significant Remembrance Day actually is. 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FARMING NOTES - December 2018

Farming news from a little further afield this month, some notes from New Zealand. I'm currently living and working in Taranaki which is located in the Western part of the North Island and is famous for the large volcanic mountain, Mt Egmont, standing in the centre of the region. The region is predominantly grassland and home to 14% of NZ's dairy herds as well as beef and sheep.

Artificial Insemination:

Being in the southern hemisphere, it is currently spring in NZ. Within the dairy sector calving has finished and most farms are in the middle of mating. New Zealand dairy farming typically follows a very seasonal pattern with cows calving over a 12 week period between July and September. This suits their predominantly grass based production and means that cows are calving as the grass growth increases.

Mating is an extremely important part of the year and something which needs to be done right to ensure cows get in calf so they will milk the following season. The majority of dairy farms will use artificial insemination (AI) for the first 4-6 weeks before using bulls for the remainder of the mating period usually totalling around 12 weeks. AI is used to allow farmers to access the best genetics from which to breed their replacement females. The conception rate is around 72%, this is very similar for both AI and natural service.

I have been working as an AI technician so it has been my job to visit 12 farms each day and serve the cows which are in heat. As it is my first season working as an AI technician I have been working alongside an experienced technician, at our busiest time we were inseminating around 160 cows each day.

Cows have a 21 day oestrous cycle. This means that a cow should be in heat which is also known as bulling every 21 days unless she is in calf. When in heat, cows will show a range of signs including standing for other cows to jump her like a bull would, increased activity and holding her milk. These signs allow farmers to identify which cows are in heat and should therefore be inseminated that day. There are a range of products which can be used to aid heat detection such as tail paint which is painted just above the tail along the ridge of the backbone; this paint will be removed when a cow is jumped by other cows.

Beef and Sheep:

In addition to AI, I have also been working on a beef and sheep farm with 1400 ewes and 600 cattle. All the stock is produced completely off grass and never housed. The cattle are grazed on a rotational system in small paddocks and shifted every 2 days to maximise grass growth, this enables more stock to be grazed on the same area. My jobs on farm include shifting stock, spraying thistles and helping with any other day to day jobs. Over the next couple of weeks we will be treating all the lambs, they are dosed with an oral wormer to kill any internal parasites, they will also be sprayed with a fly spray to prevent flies laying eggs in the wool.
