## TOWER AND THE CLOCK

The stonemasons have been on site for a month and the outside work has progressed well. Some of the cracks in the buttresses were huge but nothing unexpected and this work should come to an end in a few weeks. Linda and I braved the scaffolding and when you get close up the enormity of the Tower structure leaves you in wonder of the skill and effort required to build it all those years ago... The view is something special too!

Of course when you start to do major work a whole host of other opportunities present themselves. First we have agreed to prepare and decorate the tower wall pattress plates and install stainless steel cramps to the buttress and repair some internal wall plasterwork as well as some minor glazing repairs to the Tower window.

Then there are the two clocks faces which are badly weathered. Getting to the faces to do repair work is the problem therefore we have taken the opportunity to adjust the tower scaffolding to provide easy access. Both clock faces will be

painted and after a few colour tests we have opted for royal blue with gold for the hands and numbers. We are using high quality materials which will last for a long time. The PCC are delighted to advise that we received a very generous donation from a resident to cover the costs of the clock maintenance.

The total repair costs plus architect and structural engineer fees will be in the region of £50,000 net of VAT which will have to be paid and recovered. To date we have collectively raised £26,338. We have a further assured grant of £10,000 and hope to receive additional grants of £4,000+. Hopefully we will raise a little more and any outstanding balance will be met from reserves.

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 10th September.

Present were Chairman, three councillors, clerk, Babergh district councillor and seven members of the public.

Co-option to fill vacancy on the council. Two parishioners had put their names forward. No decision was made. An extra meeting to be held when all councillors could be in attendance.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed and signed as correct.

#### **Report from Babergh councillor Alan Ferguson:**

Although he has been proposed to represent our ward in next years election it still has to be confirmed at a selection meeting on the 24th September.

Private sector housing - Babergh has a 6½ years supply of land. Proposal for houses and flats at the Corks Lane site will go before the planning committee in October. Proposal to demolish former Angel Court and build 21 two bedroom flats has been agreed.

#### **Clerk's report:**

No action was needed at the present time to the road surface at The Splash. The owner of the trees on Cherry Hill had been contacted. Some verges had at last been cut. The clerk was frustrated at not being able to speak to anyone in person at the County Council. Councillor Robert Lindsay does what he can to help.

# Harvest?

Anyone know why schools have such enormously long summer holidays?

I asked a very clever person and they told me it's because in the olden days – that is before 1960 apparently – the children had to help work the fields to gather in the harvest, so an early September return to school made sense.

Now harvest happens at different times of year and if you ask some children where bread comes from they'll say Morrisons – or Ocado more likely.

It's not that we've lost the connection with the land, I mean we live and get educated in a village surrounded by hard working fields and hard working farmers.

I mean it's just that so few of us are actually physically engaged in the process. Just as well because I have an allergy to three things – cats, running and physical effort – I would be as much use in a harvest as a one wheeled tractor. Let's be honest, how many of us have the grit and determination to get up at 4am every day to milk a cow? OK, I hear you, you all do, it's just that I don't.

But I get that someone does, I get the sacrifice they make to ensure that the farm is still there and still feeding us not just next year but also in 10 years and 20 years time.

So when we thank God for the harvest, we also thank God for those who bring it in, we thank God that His long view of ecology is shared by many farmers, in a world where "long term" is a six week plan, we who live in the countryside thank God that he had a long term plan when he made the earth. It's extraordinary isn't it that this earth is capable of feeding 7.5 billion people. Is capable if we give up on some of the destructive practices like our addiction to palm oil, but hey, that's another story.

Meanwhile the harvest is in, there will be food on the shelves and none of it is done by magic; it's a mixture of God's creativity in making the world and His people's efforts to cultivate and nourish it.

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# FARMING NOTES October 2018

### Arable:

All ploughing for the new crop (harvest 19) has been completed and cultivations have begun. The new oilseed rape crop has been established although we have areas of damage from flea beetles that we struggle to control with our depleted chemical armoury. 300 tons of sugar beet factory lime has been spread and ploughed in to correct the pH level of the soil back to 7 - the optimum level of acidity. This is a by-product of the process of extracting sugar from the beet crop.

800 tons of farmyard manure, from the cattle and sheep, has also been spread and ploughed in, as well as needing to clear our muck hill for next winter, this has a nutrient and organic matter benefit to our fields. We aim to plough the FYM in as soon as possible, partly to avoid the loss of nutrients to the air and partly to reduce any unpleasant smell. Autumn cereal sowing will begin at the end of September and should be completed by the middle of October.

#### Livestock:

The July and August rain has been very welcome indeed, as you will have noticed with your lawns in the space of a few weeks the grass has turned from looking dead, to a lush green pasture. We applied nitrogen fertiliser which alongside the rain has helped promote the growth of lots of autumn grass which is being enjoyed by the cows and their fast growing calves. The bulls have been removed from the groups of breeding cows and housed. We are hopeful that most of the cows are in calf, if we left the bulls in for longer the naughty boys would impregnate their 6 month old daughters which can be a serious welfare issue!

The stubble turnips growing on the two arable fields near the Kersey play area are coming on well and will make excellent autumn and winter keep for some of the sheep.

An addition of two Blue Texel sheep was made to compliment the Suffolk flock last year and we plan to flush the two Blue Texel ewes for embryos soon. ET in sheep works on the same principles as it does in cattle and if successful will result in a faster expansion of the Blue flock than would be possible through natural breeding. Blue Texels are a smaller breed than Suffolks and consequently slower growing, but what they lack in growth rate is made up for by a superior carcass. Blue Texel lambs are born easily and are very active, finding the teat quickly after birth, so we hope that some of our ram customers in the future will buy some Suffolk rams and some Blue Texels.

During the summer with help from Pete we have done a lot of running repairs to the livestock buildings on the farm: several rotting posts and broken walls have been replaced as well as a dilapidated roof, and some broken concrete track has been improved. All of these investments will make the working of the livestock part of the farm better during the winter.
