KERSEY SHRINE UPDATE

The countdown continues. On Sunday 8th March Bishop Martin will rehallow the Kersey shrine space and so the north chancel will regain its purpose as a unique and inspiring place to meet with God.

Our church and its shrine was a pilgrimage destination for hundreds of years and places that have known prayer for many years are given a holiness, it's called the numinous, a sense that we are not alone, that there is more to life and that we are in the presence of one who is greater than us. Fortunately not everything in life can be explained; love, faith, courage, creativity and the numinous - all of them step outside the rigid boundaries of what can be quantified and measured - and thank God that they do.

As well as the rehallowing of the shrine space, the 8th March will begin a year of art, sculpture, poems, storytelling and music on the themes of Pietà and Pilgrimage. A range of innovative and inspiring temporary installations will come and go. Those on the theme of Pietà will reveal truths about compassion, loyalty and courage; and those on the theme of pilgrimage will explore the journeys that feed our soul. The PCC will be hosting these interactive exhibitions in the shrine space whilst we make a few changes to the permanent installation that you've already seen the designs for.

NEWS FROM KERSEY SCHOOL

Squirrels (Reception):

Squirrels have been busy retelling and acting out *The Three Little Pigs*. They are working really hard to use their phonics when reading and writing. Our topic this half term is houses and homes so we have been for a walk around the village to spot lots of different types of homes. We also looked at the different materials used to build houses. In maths the children have been using 2D shapes to create pictures.

Hedgehogs (Years 1 and 2):

In Hedgehogs we have been reading the story of *Three Little Pigs* linked to our topic on houses and homes. We have retold the story using story language and also invented our own version of the story using new characters and new building materials. We have been working hard to ensure we use punctuation in our writing.

Badgers (Years 3 and 4):

Badger's have been busy learning about Christmas in both the past and around the world. We focused on the Tudors this week and learnt all of the things they would do on Christmas Day. Did you know their Christmas dinner had 24 courses! We then created our own 12 days of Christmas filled with all the things we would like to receive. In English we are reading Phillip Pullman's *Aladdin and the Enchanted Lamp*. So far the children have written character descriptions, a diary as Aladdin and created art work on what they think the garden looks like that holds the enchanted lamp. We also enjoyed making our origami poppies ready to put on our wreath for the remembrance service on Monday.

Owls (Years 5 and 6):

Owls have continued their learning about the environment this half term; they asked to conduct a litter pick around the school and some of the surrounding roads and hedgerows, which they completed with great enjoyment! As part of our learning about humility in collective worship, we made some art work from rubbish. The children enjoyed serving their community and are keen to have another litter pick later on in the year.

FARMING NOTES

Arable:

As you will all know too well, the weather in November has continued in a similar vein to the preceding month, allowing only a limited amount of work on the land to be completed and then only in very poor conditions. As I write, on the 24th November, we are still waiting for a prolonged dry, windy period to complete the autumn work, although it may well be a vain hope. We are continuing with building repairs in the meantime.





FARMING NOTES (cont.)

As the roads around the farm are not wide enough to accommodate a 'maus' sugar beet loading system — loading direct from field to lorry, I am hoping to source for hire, a 'chaser wagon' — a trailer that transfers the beet from harvester to waiting trailers in order to keep the trailers on the road to negate the usual muddy roads. Failing this we will be forced to carry on as usual and clear the road afterwards as we normally do.

Cattle:

With the last group housed in early November all of the cattle are now settled into their winter routine at Bridges Farm. The cows have all been pregnancy scanned with very acceptable results. About 70 of the 90 breeding females are in calf and due to calve from February onwards. One small group were not run with a bull during the summer; these are empty and being lined up to receive pedigree British Blue embryos in a few weeks time. A second small group which were implanted with embryos in February are due to calve in December. These different groups have to be housed in separate yards and fed differently, complicating the whole issue, however higher returns for the calves from these cattle should help to compensate for that.

TB (Bovine Tuberculosis):

TB is a big problem for farmers in the West of the country and Wales. On farms or in areas where there is an outbreak of TB, movements of cattle are restricted and farmers have to test their cattle every year or in some cases more often than that. Badgers are often blamed for spreading TB with badger culling a very contentious issue. Fortunately here in the East there is not too much of a problem and our badger population is believed to be TB free. Consequently we are only required by government to test for TB once every four years. Our vet did our annual TB test recently, this involves running the entire adult portion of the herd through the cattle handling facilities on two occasions three days apart which is a logistical challenge, but with help from Sarah, Jimmy and Ryan we managed this and were pleased to be found to be clear of TB again. Whilst handling the cattle we also took blood samples from them which will be tested as part of our herd high health program for other cattle diseases: Bovine Viral Diarrhoea (BVD), Johnes Disease and Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis (IBR). You can probably see why we use abbreviations for these horrible sounding cattle diseases. We have not had the results back vet so fingers crossed!

Sheep:

The borrowed ram was returned to his home farm recently, we will find out if he has done his job when we pregnancy scan the ewes just before Christmas.

PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on Monday 18th. November.

Present were Chairman John Hume, six councillors, clerk, District councillor and two members of the public.

Apologies were received from County Councillor Robert Lindsay who was unable to attend because of illness. The chairman would like good wishes from the meeting passed on to him for a speedy recovery.

Babergh District Councillor Leigh Jamieson spoke about the Babergh name change. The meeting to discuss this was cancelled as it was unlikely to get the majority vote needed. This could still be brought up at a later date. Digital first. Senior staff and councillors are being challenged to go paperless for council and committee papers. Distributing hard copies cost £50,000 a year. Parking in the district is being reviewed. With the housing growth planned additional parking will be needed. Some councillors felt this was the wrong way forward and they should be looking at alternative transport to cars. The district CIL money has been distributed. There will be free swimming in the district for under 17's over the Christmas holidays.

Report from County Councillor Robert Lindsay: There had been a cabinet reshuffle. An apology had been given over the way the school travel policy was handled. Suffolk health visitors are concerned that their numbers are being cut due to a new In house contract.

Previous minutes were confirmed and signed as correct.

Clerk's report: The hedge in Vale Lane had been cut. An appeal had been made against refusal for a grit bin on Church Hill. The verges on Cherry Hill were eventually cut although it was noted none of the verges in the village had been cut up to standard. Some potholes had been reported, the clerk urged everyone to use the online tool. The VETS grant had been approved.

Correspondence: The council had been asked if they would contribute towards keeping the local buses running. As they were not supported by villagers the councillors were sceptical about donating. A reminder had been given about the change of days for waste disposal over the Christmas and New Year. Other items included the SALC AGM and Babergh name change.

Finance: Bank balances were noted and expenditure agreed. The insurance had been paid.

Internal audit: All was in order.

Planning progress: Outline planning application for dwellings on land west of Vale Lane had been refused by Babergh council.

Footpaths: All paths were walkable. The dog bins are being well used.

KCPC: £644 was raised from the recent quiz night. A maintenance day had been held. The committee are looking into the cost of a swing for disabled children. The ROSPA report had been received.

PARISH COUNCIL

Glebe: Councillors had been asked whether they would consider any payment towards cutting of the Glebe field during the school holidays. County Council to be reminded of the original agreement on the grass cutting.

Speeding and road safety: A letter from a resident had been received on concerns about speeding. One councillor felt that the important part was near the church/school entrance and whether the limit could be reduced to 20mph. The clerk said this area wouldn't meet with the CC criteria for a reduction and that we didn't wish for any infrastructure. Lindsey parish council would support a letter being sent to the Highways department concerning the Crossroads. Work to the right of the junction would be undertaken in the winter months. The landowner to be asked to cut the tree back on the left side.

PHP: There had not been a great response to the questionnaire which had been delivered round the village. Some suggestions were for a car park, disabled entrance and solar panels at Village Hall, tennis court, footpath from Vale Lane and under grounding of wires. Update will be given at a later meeting.

Housing needs survey: Progress will be discussed at December meeting.

Dates for 2020 meetings were given. (See below.)

Clerk's job appraisal: The chairman said she was invaluable to the council and they were very fortunate to have her.

Emails: Councillors would receive agendas by email but as at present boards in the parish would continue to display them.

Budget and precept: This was discussed and provisional precept was set.

Boundary review: Councillors were happy with Suffolk CC boundary review.

Training: Three councillors had booked to attend a training session. The clerk had attended a Shaping Suffolk meeting.

AOB: Litter was becoming a problem again. Volunteers are to be given a designated area in which to litter pick. The school children had litter picked around the school and church. A drone had been seen in the vicinity of the church.

Next extraordinary meeting on the 16th December.

Council News

At the October Council meeting a motion was put forward for cabinet to review car parking across the district, but particularly in Sudbury and Hadleigh. With increases in housing across the district the review will be looking at all aspects of car parking. Unfortunately the focus of the motion put forward was extra capacity. We, along with other members of the council from all parties, feel that taking extra capacity as the default position is wrong. We feel that we need to provide people with alternatives first, to reduce traffic on our roads and in our villages. We were successful in amending the motion so that it considers other options before deciding on the correct level of parking required.

However, with Suffolk County Council already looking to cut bus subsidies and with the bus companies reviewing some of their commercial routes increasing public transport will be difficult. Looking nationwide other councils across the country are already trying novel ideas. For example Bristol's plans to ban Diesel cars from the city centre or Nottingham putting a parking levy on business that is ring fenced for public transport. While these may not work for Babergh we do need to perhaps think outside of the box.

Sporting Memories

The Sporting Memories project, run by the national charity *The Sporting Memories Foundation*, helps fight rural isolation and supports those living with dementia, brings together anyone over the age of 50 to talk about sport and their recollections of great sporting occasions. By using a collection of iconic images, newsletter, film and memorabilia to engage people in conversation, reminiscence, enjoy a cup of tea or coffee and if suitable enjoy a little gentle exercise at the end of the session.
