KERSEY CHURCH TO LIGHT UP PURPLE!

During November, all over the country, various landmarks will be glowing with purple light as part of the Purple Lights for pancreatic cancer campaign - A national campaign supported by UK Charities who call upon supporters to organise venues, landmarks and homes in the UK to light up purple. Kersey Church is supporting this initiative again and will be lit purple on November 21st, World Pancreatic Cancer Day, 2019.

Organised by individuals affected by the disease, the campaign is a way to remember all loved ones sadly lost to pancreatic cancer, acknowledge those living with and beyond the disease and to raise vital awareness. Pancreatic cancer is the toughest cancer to diagnose, treat and survive. The five year survival rate is less than 7%. Nearly half of people are diagnosed as an emergency in our A&E system. The average life expectancy on diagnosis is four to six months. Change is needed - fast. We need to recognise and treat this illness within weeks, not months. We take everything for granted here and it was very humbling to hear her talk about the children and how they cope with everyday life. The colourful beads and bracelets she brought for members to purchase were made from paper (you would never know) by Ugandan women. Also for sale were aprons and other crafts. We Will Remember

It's the end of October as I write this, which means there are only 23 Brexit votes till Christmas; and we look at the shouting, slogan waving, binary "I'm right and you're the spawn of the devil" back stabbing, double dealing shenanigans in Parliament and recall Churchill's words:

"Many forms of Government have been tried, and will be tried in this world of sin and woe. No one pretends that democracy is perfect or all-wise. Indeed it has been said that democracy is the worst form of Government, except for all those other forms that have been tried from time to time..."

Parliament's behaviour doesn't make us proud of our democracy but it does symbolise one welcome truth – we are free. Free to think, love, feel, vote, speak, worship, marry and free to screw up a national decision by turning it into a two option shouting match – let's create an argument and stick a wall down the middle. Freedom to love and freedom to shout but free none-the-less. Freedom clearly has its complications but it is the yearning of every woman and man in the world – those caught up in human trafficking in Birmingham and those terrorised is Basra.

In the last one hundred years, the commonwealth of this nation and our allies have twice crossed the English Channel to bring freedom to invaded and brutalised countries, indeed in 1939-1945 to answer the cries of the entire enslaved continent. HADLEIGH CHORAL SOCIETY

VILLAGE PRODUCE ASSOCIATION

The VPA committee met on the 28th of October. Minutes of previous meeting were read and signed as correct.

Matters Arising: The new tables which had recently been purchased had worked well at the flower show.

Finance: Show and outing accounts were shown. The show had made a small profit this year. The outing to Wisley had not been very well supported and had made a significant loss.

Marquee lettings were down on previous years. It was agreed to give donations to help towards the churchyard, floodlights and parish newsletter.

Flower show date is set for the 12th September 2020.

Outing: Some suggestions were made and will be discussed at the schedule meeting in January.

FARMING NOTES

Arable:

During the month that has elapsed since I wrote the last set of farming notes we have had no suitable conditions for sowing the winter wheat and barley, so effectively we have seamlessly moved from drought to waterlogged soils, with nothing in between. It is very unusual, and quite damaging to our business, not to sow any winter crops in October. As the autumn wears on it takes longer for the ground to dry, even if we do get a dry spell, due to shorter days and the usual foggy November weather. I think it is true to say that in the last 50 years of farming this is the first time we have drilled nothing in October, and it will be interesting to see what the official total rainfall is for the month. My guess is around 120mm, which will be another first!

Of course we have not been idle while waiting on the weather; we have applied 300 tons of sugar beet factory lime to 75 acres of grassland to counteract the natural soil acidity, which should result in improving grass yields next year. Also a lot of ditch maintenance and tree work has been carried out, and the machinery has never been so well looked after at this time of year!

Let's hope for a dry, windy November so we can get on with the drilling of winter cereals and lifting of the sugar beet.



FARMING NOTES (cont.)

Cattle:

Most of the cattle have now been housed and the calves weaned from their mothers. Since the very welcome rain arrived there has been some regrowth of autumn grass, to make use of this and save on winter feed and straw, one group of 22 cows have been turned out again after weaning, and are grazing over a fairly large area. The rest of the cows are on winter rations of straw, mineral blocks and malt nuts. The calves have been weighed and wormed with a pour-on treatment and are now enjoying recently lifted fodder beet as part of their winter ration.

Sheep:

Just a few days before the ewes were to be introduced to the rams, one of our stock rams achieved every sheep's lifetime ambition... he died, he was not old, no warning or illness – just turned up his toes! Any sheep farmer will tell you it goes with the territory, but that does not make it any less frustrating. With 90 ewes and only one experienced ram I had to call on a local sheep breeding friend and was fortunate to be able to borrow a ram. Quite possibly the borrowed ram is actually better genetically than the one which died, so things may turn out OK.

Some time ago I was invited to judge a regional Suffolk Sheep flock competition, and last week Sarah and I spent an eniovable couple of days visiting 9 pedigree flocks in the south of England. including 3 flocks on the Isle of Wight. There are a number of different categories which owners enter: flock ewes: ewe lambs: stock rams etc. which makes the judging tricky especially as you



can't see the sheep all in one place. However, with the use of photographs and copious notes we managed to come up with an order which we were happy with. The winning flock usually hosts an open day to which other breeders are invited.

Our 50 March born ewe lambs are now enjoying the catch crop of stubble turnips which were sowed just after harvest and just before the rain started, we are ready for it to stop now!

PARISH COUNCIL

An extraordinary meeting of the Parish Council was held on the 14th October. Present were Chairman, five councillors, clerk and three members of the public.

The chairman began by thanking all those who had organised the flower festival. He said it was a magnificent event.

Apologies were received from one councillor.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed and signed as correct.

Planning: Babergh council had granted permission for installation of an oak framed window at 2 Ancient houses.

Linton House – An appeal has been made to the Secretary of State against the decision of Babergh council to refuse permission for a single storey dwelling.

Holtons, Uplands – The applicant was present and outlined the history of both applications.

- (1) Change of use and conversion of agricultural buildings to a dwelling. It was agreed that the existing buildings were not attractive in their current state. The proposals were in keeping with the surroundings and would provide an additional dwelling in the parish. Councillors fully supported this application.
- (2) Erection of dwelling and cart lodge following demolition of existing dwelling. Some councillors had concerns about demolishing an old building however it was not listed and not really suitable for modern living. The proposal was in keeping with other properties in the area. It was agreed to support by a majority decision.

PARISH COUNCIL

Progress on creating a parish infrastructure investment plan and submitting a CIL funding application:

A consultation leaflet had been delivered to households in the parish. There had not been very many responses. Items suggested were for a tennis court on the Glebe, improved playground facilities, improved facilities at the Village Hall, undergrounding of overhead services in the Conservation area and a car park. It was agreed councillors were not ready for the October deadline but would work towards applying in May 2020.

To consider whether Kersey should carry out a housing needs survey.

This survey would provide evidence of any need for additional housing in Kersey in the next few years. Two councillors agreed to look at options and costs for carrying out a survey. They would report back at next meeting.

AOB: The chairman had met with the clerk and carried out her appraisal, he will report back at next meeting.

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BABERGH DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mental Health

The Sudbury and Stowmarket Voluntary and Statutory Partnerships (VASPs) marked World Mental Health Day on Thursday 10 October with an invitation to residents to join them to find out more about the mental health services available in their towns.

The theme of this year's global day was suicide prevention. We forget sometimes as we live in our idyllic villages and pretty homes that it is easy for people to become lonely and isolated. In these circumstances people can end up in a difficult situation.

Cllr Derek Davis, Babergh District Council's Cabinet Member for Communities, said: "Mental Health Awareness is crucial for us all to be able to recognise problems within our family, friends, colleagues and sometimes even strangers. We have to recognise their personal story and try to convince them in their darkest hour that there is another way other than taking their life, to find light and hope."

As a council, can we help and if so, do we do enough? These are questions I am seeking an answer to.

Babergh District Council has now published a new annual five-year housing land supply position statement which demonstrates a 5.67-year supply, alongside the Joint Annual Monitoring Report with Mid Suffolk District Council.

Climate and Biodiversity Emergency

The council have now declared a biodiversity emergency alongside the Climate emergency motion that was approved in July. This sets out a number of key objectives including –

- Creation and development of a Wildlife Network Map from which Wildlife Corridors
 will be identified and created. The map, available to the public, will assist the District
 to develop Eco Tourism.
- Introduction of the 'Trees for Life' scheme in Babergh District. This offers every family
 with a new-born baby a tree to plant. The trees to be planted will be native trees and
 will be locally grown and sourced.

The task force that was promised in July, to monitor and develop these ideas has now been set up and meetings have started.
