PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on the 28th. January. Present were five councillors, clerk, County and District councillors and ten members of the public.

Apologies were received from one councillor.

Vacancy. Stuart McQuaker was co-opted to fill the vacancy on the council.

Reports. Suffolk County Councillor Robert Lindsay spoke of the council's announcement to cut funding to Citizen Advice Bureaus as part of budget savings. This will now be phased over two years. Councillors agreed unanimously to a motion put forward for SCC to do more to tackle single use plastic waste in the county. Nothing was agreed for tackling carbon emissions. A new person has been appointed for Growth, Highways and Infrastructure. Plans to build a big bridge over the Orwell in Ipswich have been dropped. Plans for two smaller bridges will still go ahead. He also spoke about much needed investment for Special Educational Needs children and a schools admissions consultation.

District councillor Alan Ferguson gave his best wishes to everyone for 2019. He said this would be an interesting year both national and local. He went on to speak about developments concerning the Local plan. Plans for development at the Corks Lane building have been approved by Babergh but still has to be approved by the planning committee. The planning committee has approved development for Angel Court, this will be demolished and replaced by 21 new dwellings. Looking ahead to 2020 this will be a challenging time concerning the budget. The proposal for free brown bins will not happen.

Minutes from the last meeting were confirmed and signed as correct.

Clerks report. Winter gritting would be carried out on all P2 routes in Kersey when necessary. The grit bin in Vale Lane would be topped up. Following concerns about HGVs using Wickerstreet Green as an alternative route to access a business on Cox Hill, Boxford the council has been assured there would be no extra traffic.

Correspondence. Amongst correspondence was a letter from a group of residents regarding the way a planning matter had been discussed at the last meeting. The meeting was informed that all councillors had acted correctly.

Finance. Bank balances were shown

and discussed. No payments had been made since last meeting. Payments were due for clerks salary and expenses.

Babergh Communities Strategy. It was agreed that anyone could respond to this as an individual rather than send a response from the Parish Council.

KCPC. The chestnut fencing around the play area needs to be replaced. Estimates are being sought. One piece of play equipment is unsafe and has been removed.

Footpath working group. All paths are walkable. Some directional posts have been replaced. Dog mess continues to be a problem on certain paths. It was agreed to purchase three new dog bins to make it easier for dog walkers to dispose of bags. These to be sited at the top of the path opposite The Priory, on the triangle at the top of Vale Lane and one in Wickerstreet Green. These bins are being sponsored by Kersey Mill and The Bell.

Community Infrastructure Levy Expenditure and Parish Infrastructure Investment plans. After discussion it was agreed to go ahead with a plan. Four councillors would form a sub committee.

Election. Parish Council and District Council elections will be held on the 2nd May. Nomination papers will be available in early March and must be submitted by the 3rd April.

Litter collection. Date agreed was 2nd March. Litter picker's hi-vis jackets and bags will be available.

Budget and Precept. The budget was confirmed and the precept was set at £7,990.

Training. An update was given on individual training sessions. It was agreed to try and arrange some planning training for the whole council.

Babergh Area meeting. Two councillors had attended. One query raised was about poor signage for road closures and removal of signs when work is completed. Any problems should be reported on the SCC website.

AOB. It was asked if anything could be done to encourage home owners to remove bins from the roadside when they have been emptied. They look unsightly and are sometimes in a dangerous position. An informal meeting is to be held to discuss the idea of creating a Neighbourhood Plan.

Parish time. A member of the public didn't think the council should start looking at a Neighbourhood Plan or Parish Infrastructure Investment plans until after the elections. There could be new councillors with conflicting views. Councillors agreed that the work of the council would not stand still until after the election. Concerns were raised about the gritting especially on Church Hill. It was requested that a grit bin should be put in this location. Concerns were also raised about speeding on Church Hill and other parts of the village. An item to be put in the newsletter asking residents to slow down.

FARMING NOTES - March 2019

Arable:

The spring malting barley that we sowed in early January (mentioned in last month's notes) has emerged satisfactorily, albeit rather slowly due to the cold weather, although the current spell of spring like conditions should help. These same conditions have encouraged us to apply all 80 tons of base fertiliser to all winter cereals and Oilseed Rape. This fertiliser product contains all the necessary phosphate and potash along with the first dose of nitrogen and a small amount of sulphur to aid speedy intake of the aforesaid. It is interesting to note that the sulphur has only been necessary since the mid 1990's as previously enough sulphur was present in the atmosphere. This shows how much industrial pollution has been eliminated.

We have also been working on one of our meadows doing a once in 30 year operation, including coppicing the hedge, re-digging the ditch and renewing the livestock

fencing. This always looks rather drastic but coppicing is necessary to keep the hedges in good health for the long term, and the scars are quickly eliminated bv Mother Nature.



Cattle:

After selling some cull cows, young bulls to Cogent and some finished animals over the Christmas period, cattle numbers dropped to an annual low of 155 head in January. Calving started as expected at the beginning of February and at the time of writing about 40 (half) of the calves have been born. It is a busy time: as well as overseeing calving and assisting some deliveries; we spray the navels of



new-borns on arrival to reduce infections, it is then essential to make sure that they receive adequate amounts of colostrum (mother's first milk) in the first few hours of life. Calves are tagged and recorded in the first couple of days, and dehorned at about two weeks of age.

Some of the new arrivals are the result of embryos collected and implanted 9 months

ago. These have resulted in some smart pedigree British Blue calves being born to crossbred recipient mothers, hopefully adding value. British blues can vary in colour from white to black. Dairy customers prefer to use white bulls while farmers buying our bulls to produce beefy calves from suckler cows tend to go for the blue, black and white, or black versions. The darker animals are usually preferred at shows. But as my father used to say: "A good horse is never a bad colour".

Sheep:

These notes are being written at 3 am! At lambing time we try to check the sheep (which have just been housed), every hour or so. Sarah helps a huge amount during this time, both during the day and while I sleep during the evening, I am then available from 2 am onwards. Some ewes need assistance and we want to make sure that lambs get a good start and a tummy full of colostrum ASAP. The main aim is to keep as many of the lambs alive as possible.

During quiet times this does allow time to read and catch up with paperwork and still leaves me available all day for other routine tasks. Our social lives go on hold for the three weeks of main lambing...

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FLY-TIPPING

Around 27th or 28th January this rubbish from somebody's new flooring and bathroom was dumped on the road to Bildeston just north of Kersey.

If you know who is responsible for this, or any other incidents of fly-tipping, please report them. It's your countryside too!

Everyone has a legal responsibility or 'duty of care' to make sure that all waste from their household or business is disposed of correctly and doesn't end up being fly-tipped. Some people make money by charging to take waste away

illegally and then fly-tipping it. You could face penalties of up to £5,000 if you don't check that the company or person you give waste to disposes of it correctly.

If you discover fly-tipped waste, there are some dos and don'ts:

Don't:

- Don't touch the waste it may contain syringes, toxic chemicals or other hazardous substances.
- Don't disturb the site there may be evidence that could help identify the flytippers and lead to their prosecution.

Do:

- Visually try to work out what the waste consists of and how much there is take photos if it is safe to do so.
- Make a note of the day, date and time you saw the tipping, its exact location and whether it's in or near water. Keep any notes you make, even scribbled ones, as they can be very valuable as evidence.
- Report it to Babergh District Council as soon as possible.

If you witness someone fly-tipping, make a note of:

- How many people are involved and what they look like.
- What has been dumped how much and what it looks like.
- Details of any vehicles involved including make, colour and registration number if possible.
- Call 999 if the incident is still in progress.

Be very careful. Remember that fly-tippers are doing something illegal – they are unlikely to welcome people observing them or taking notes or photographs
