

BEATING THE BOUNDS



Snowdrops and Daffodils.

They mean different things, snowdrops and daffodils. In January and early February we have that feeling that somehow winter is here to stay, like it started three years ago and will probably carry on for another eight or nine months. In the street below the church the rich scent of woodsmoke fills the air, much as it might have done five hundred years ago when visitors travelled across Europe to visit our Shrine. The Splash is in full spate, the roads are icy and there seems to be a distinct lack of colour, as if nature has given everything a grey-brown hue.

Then overnight the snowdrops appear. They're a joyous sight, the end of the Rectory garden has quite a few that the pony hasn't trampled and when I see them in the churchyard I sense that the seasons are changing. Except that they're not. Snowdrops are sneaky flowers, they pop up and say "winter's ending" when actually they mean "February, you forgot about February". There is no other month like Feb. It's cold and damp like it never used to be, I mean I'm sure last February wasn't as bad as this year's and the one before was lovely wasn't it? This year, like all years, February is grim.

Then sometime around the first of March something miraculous happens. The first daffs appear. A shot of bright yellow, green and those crazy ones with orange middles that look a bit weird. The garden at the Rectory has a large bank of them and they're a blaze of colour. They're also really handy when you've forgotten it's Mothers' Day and can quickly snip a few and take them round.

They signal that even if there's a few more icy blasts, the nine year winter we've just endured is coming to an end. It's official, the daffs have spoken. And this year they've coincided with the end of a year of lockdowns. I mean I know The Bell isn't quite open – that's what I'm looking forward to most – but there are some signs that it's OK to emerge from our hibernation hiatus. I can go to the really nice Aldi near Southwold and the children can have an ice cream at Felixstowe. All without fear of arrest. That's daffodil season that is. The services are up and running at our gorgeous church, the bells are being rung again, we've got the May Kersey Craft Fair coming up, those are signs of a changing season.

We've been locked up for too long and cautiously we need to reconnect. There are signs of hope and the promise of resurrection. Because that's what the daffs really signal. They appear at Easter time, a blaze of sunlight

like the morning light that shone in the empty tomb as the stone was rolled away. We've all been in the cold grey tomb, locked up and apart. It's the resurrection of Jesus those 2000 years ago that energises the resurrection of our world, especially this year.

May the light of Christ shine in the homes of hope and also in the places of fear and may we emerge in Kersey stronger and more connected this Easter.

NEWS FROM KERSEY SCHOOL

Otters (Reception, Years 1 and 2):

With a return to school Otters Class have been very busy.

We have continued our learning about plants and seeds by starting our very own cress experiment, placing the seeds in different places and using different variables to see how they grow. In our class vote, most of us thought that the seeds that have water and sunlight will grow the best and we are checking every day to see what happens.





We have also celebrated World Book Day and had a whole school celebration where we were able to make our very own wooden spoon book character. It was so much fun to design and create whilst also sharing our favourite books with each other. The children in Otters loved the opportunity to work with the Badgers and Owls.

It was wonderful to celebrate our mums on Mother's Day and all the children in Otters had a go at sewing a beautiful flower to decorate the card they made. The children were very proud of their creations and were so eager to make them with such care for their mums.

Badgers (Years 3 and 4):

"Once upon a time..." Badgers class went 'Into the Forest' with our author for the term, Anthony Browne. We have enjoyed his 'twist' on a traditional tale and written our own versions using tips and tricks from his books. We have also shared other Anthony Browne books that we like. In art, we have examined his illustrations, discussed and used warm, cool and complimentary colours to respond to the book.

For Mothering Sunday, we wrote kenning poems about the important women in our lives, made and decorated cards with heart and flower designs and presented them with daffodils and chocolates kindly donated by St Mary's church. Our creativity continued when, as a school, we worked with buddies to make World Book Day characters from wooden spoons.

The variety of designs and characters were incredible and the pupils thoroughly enjoyed learning together. Harry Potter, Mr Stink, the Gruffalo and others will decorate our school entrance and remind us of the wonderful time we had.

"The Romans" is our topic and we have learned about their invasion, Boudicca's revolt and Hadrian's wall. The class have been really keen to learn about this period of history and have developed their understanding and explaining skills further. To finish we will investigate the 'Romanisation' of Britain.



Owls (Years 5 and 6):

FARMING NOTES

Arable:

As the month of March runs out we are pretty much on schedule with our arable work. All of the base fertiliser and some of the nitrogen has been applied to our autumn sown crops. The first sowing of spring malting barley took place in the first dry spell of the year around the 6th of the month and it remained dry enough to roll the sowed area to give a good firm bed for the seed (photo below).



I am pleased to say that we also were able to do some cultivations in preparation for sugar beet sowing at the end of the month. This will encourage some weeds to germinate and hopefully they will be destroyed in the pre-drilling cultivations and give us a clean start for the new crop. It is however, a different story for the land behind the most recent crop of sugar beet where the soil remains stubbornly wet and difficult to work. This has been an unfortunate feature of the last few years and coupled with poor yields, the removal of some very useful chemistry for environmental reasons and low prices, means 2022 will see the last crop of sugar beet on this farm. This will be a relief and allow us to repair extensive damage to our soil structure and our tracks and field gateways, although alternative cropping will need to be investigated. The opening of Ipswich sugar beet factory in the mid 1920's (closed now for many years) is when I think sugar beet were first grown here, so I think 95 years is long enough!

Livestock:

Calving is three quarters completed now with over 50 live calves having been born. We had a couple of losses but otherwise it has been a good year so far. Cogent are keen that we should supply them with lots of white Pedigree British Blue bulls and we are striving to breed these, however this season and last we have had an abnormal number of pedigree heifer calves born which is frustrating on the short term, but as these will eventually join the breeding herd, it bodes well for the longer term. The pedigree calves are named using a year letter and we have had fun choosing "R"

names, so far this year we have boys: Rhinestone and Rebel with heifers: Razzmatazz, Rose, Rolo, Rio and Ripple who will join Polo, Pavlova, Pinot, Prosecco and Pimms from last year. Possibly those names say more about us than they do about the cattle!

We recently welcomed home an old friend who we did not expect to see again: Kersey Linchpin was sold to Cogent in 2017. Having spent 4 years in their stud and after producing well over 30 000 doses of very saleable semen he developed a fertility problem which means that his semen is no longer of good enough quality for Cogent to freeze and sell. In the normal turn of events this would mean curtains for the bull but we and Cogent think so much of Linchpin that we agreed to have him back in the hope that he will father more calves here by natural service. If you see him he is difficult to miss as he is the only mature all white bull on the farm and weighs well over a tonne.

Lambing is now almost completed. On the whole things have gone well although as ever with livestock, and pedigree livestock in particular there are always niggles and frustrations. Ewes only have two teats and so generally Suffolks are not capable of rearing three lambs. When we have triplets born (there were 12 sets this year) we try to adopt a lamb across to a ewe who has had a single lamb. This does not always work and sometimes there is no ewe available to adopt to, so inevitably we end up bottle feeding some lambs.



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PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met remotely via Zoom on 1st March.

Present was Chairman John Hume, six councillors, clerk and three members of the public. County and District councillors were present for reports and to answer questions.

The chair announced the sad passing of Nora Ryde who used to regularly attend the council meetings. She made a big contribution to the parish during her life especially the Village Hall.

Reports: County councillor Robert Lindsay. His report contained items on the budget, the joint bid with Norfolk for funding flood protection schemes, money received for highway repairs and transport policy for students after sixteen.

District councillor report from Leigh Jamieson. Car parking charges will begin no earlier than 1st October. One hours free parking was agreed. The council approved General Fund Budget proposals and Housing Revenue Account Budget. Census day will be on 21st March. New table of fares for Hackney carriages will come into effect from 5th April. A motion was submitted by some councillors calling for the resignation of the council leader. The motion was rejected.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed as correct.

Clerk's report: A notice about the parish footpaths has been in our own newsletter and should also be in other local news magazines this month. The clerk has registered some roads in the parish as "Quiet Lanes". The police had been contacted for advice concerning two near misses with vehicles and horse riders.

Finance: Bank balances were noted and payments approved for redesigning the footpath map, KCPC mower belt and clerk's salary and expenses. All other financial matters were discussed and agreed.

Planning: Progress. 1 Ancient houses. Application for internal alterations had been withdrawn. Babergh had approved plans for shed/wood store. A garden shed at Little Manor had been approved by Babergh. It had been confirmed that prior permission was not needed for building at Bridges Farm.

Footpath working group: Paths which had suffered with flooding are recovering well. The budget was approved. The dog bins are being well used. Some cyclists are still using the paths. Another volunteer has joined the group.

KCPC: Budget was approved. Two volunteers have been looking after the playground, the normal grass cutting rota will start when Covid restrictions are lifted. Funding has been secured for improvements. An order has been placed for the basket swing. Repairs are needed to the pedestrian entrance to the playing field. Some money had been received from the District councillor's locality budget.

Review effectiveness of internal audit and review of Risk Management policy, Business Risk register and risk assessments. Both done.

Consider any actions necessary due to the Covid 19 pandemic. Community support

is still in place. The playground is continuing to be open. It is not yet known whether parish council meetings will be able to continue via Zoom after May. The April meeting will be via Zoom and the date for the meeting in May has been brought forward to 4th May.

Content for newsletter. Next month it would be called "Part of your parish". Litter on the main road from Hadleigh was spoken about. This was up to Babergh council to clear, volunteers must not collect litter on the main road.

Training: Clerk had attended a networking session. A councillor would attend a SALC meeting on Zoom.

AOB: Filming is to take place in Kersey next month.

Next meeting is on the 12th April which is the Annual Parish Assembly, 6.00pm via Zoom.


