Reg Farthing was a true village person. He was born in a cottage on Priory Hill and lived all his life in the village. He attended the village school before going to Hadleigh where he left at the age of fourteen. His first job was delivering oil then a milk round before settling at Kersey Priory where he worked for fifty years until he retired. At the age of eighteen he was called up serving in the army in Malaya, Trieste and Germany. In his younger days he played cricket and football and has been a lifelong supporter of Ipswich Town. Amongst his many interests was playing quoits and darts for The Kersey Bell and over the years has enjoyed many whist drives and regular bingo sessions. He was a long standing member of the Royal British Legion where he loved a game of cribbage.

On his retirement he volunteered at the Shelley Riding School and stayed for twenty years. He had endured operations and treatment for a few years but was always determined to carry on and could regularly be seen taking a walk when he would like to stop and chat.

The funeral service took place at St Mary's church on the 28th. He was laid to rest in the churchyard. Donations in his memory are for The Shelley Centre for Therapeutic Riding.

The Accidental Ecologist

The Rectory is surrounded by houses with front lawns so neatly trimmed I think they must use nail scissors for the final trim, things of lush green beauty that must take real dedication. It reminds me of the story of the American tourist visiting the Tower of London, he asked one of the Beefeaters how they kept the lawns looking so lovely "Oh it's nothing special sir, you just overseed occasionally, mow regularly and catch the weeds before they grow. Oh and you have to do that for 400 years, then it starts to look nice."

Well back in March this year I was doing a bit of paddock preparation and the mower blade hit a lump of wood in the grass. Well I say grass, there were a couple of tufts somewhere in the weeds. Anyway there was a clang and a bit of metal flew off and the mower started to vibrate like a massive vibratey machine thingy and threatened to destroy itself so I stopped it and looked underneath, the mower blade had a chunk out of it and was completely unbalanced. No problem I thought, Amazon to the rescue, but the mower it turns out is a bit of a specialist model, bought by SWMBO from Facebook Marketplace (I know, completely addictive isn't it) and Amazon were out of stock. So I rang a specialist garden place "I'm sorry sir, there are none of those blades in the country, it's a German make and because of Brexit we can't get any, lots of people are asking because it's a popular blade".

Now I'm not one to have a go at people on the phone, well not very often, but I wanted to say "tosh" and "paff" because: A) Brexit is just a catch all excuse, like the supermarket who ran out of nappies a few days after the vote and publicly blamed it on Brexit when actually they'd forgotten to put the order in and B) Do people ever listen to themselves when they say "Oh yes we get lots of people wanting to buy ice creams but we don't stock them?" I mean, do they ever say to themselves "Oh wait a minute, we could start selling ice creams couldn't we? Turns out people expect us to sell them".

So my specialist mower uses a popular blade that no one thought to order stocks of before Brexit. And that is the reason my mower wouldn't work and in no way connected to me running over a lump of wood because I wasn't concentrating.

My daily search for a blade came up empty but then a wonderful and miraculous thing happened, a joyous miracle, I discovered that actually I was virtuous, ahead of the curve and David Attenborough's new best friend. Because dear parishioners, I had discovered that there is this thing called No-Mow-May and that actually I was near singlehandedly saving the Suffolk bee population. That's right, when you tuck into your honey drizzle cake or a humble sandwich for that matter, you can thank me. Because it turns out that bees and other flying pollinators need us to leave their habitats alone during the spring, and thanks to my little accident, and Brexit, and the lack of foresight on the part of the UK distributors, I was now an ecologist, albeit

And the second thought was that what became of our plan to purposefully rewild our stunningly beautiful churchyard at St Marys? I mean I do know what happened, it's a five letter word beginning with C and ending in D but it's time I think to dust off those ambitions and begin talking about how we can do that in a way that honours the purpose of the churchyard and joins in partnership with nature.

And next spring I shall post a sign at Rectory Castle to say "I'm not mowing because of the bees, not because I can't be bovered." Thankfully Tuesday this week a new blade arrived, sadly the wrong size and had to be swapped but they got the right one to me yesterday and our front lawn now looks as beautiful as any lawn could – well one that's been left to go to the dogs for six months and then viciously hacked about in a spirit of "let's just get this done shall we?"

NEWS FROM KERSEY SCHOOL

Otters (Reception, Years 1 and 2):

All Creatures Great and Small

After last half term's learning about some of the greats including lions, crocodiles and many other animals from Africa, this half term Otters class are moving on to learn about smaller creatures.

Starting with learning about how important bees are to our world. This amazing book illustrates how busy





the bees are, working with the nature around them where our story is set in the French countryside. We will learn about where Belle lives in Paris and compare the differences between the two locations. To learn more about bees we have planned a visit from a local bee keeper and are excited to see all the equipment needed and have a chance to learn from an expert.

We will move on to making wormeries and bug hotels in our discovery and exploration of insects. The book 'Yucky Worms' has a lot of information and is a fun way to learn about what happens underground!

Otters class are also excited to take part in sports week, including the first sports day for some of our class. FARMING NOTES

Arable:

June is a quieter month on the arable side of the farm. I am writing these notes from the banks of the river Deveron in Aberdeenshire, north east Scotland, 575 miles north of Kersey, where I am enjoying a week of salmon and sea trout fishing. The Turriff area is noted for its fine quality soil, growing good cereal, vegetables, and especially grass. The weather here is similar to Kersey, perhaps a little cooler, but the big difference is daylight hours — much longer in the summer and it is not light for long in the winter. As we are here during the summer equinox the nights are as short as they get and as I am night fishing that suits me! It's only dark for about 2 hours and even then is not as dark as Suffolk. The crops in this area look extremely promising this year. Rather like us, they have had a warm and wet month of June which as we know keeps crops in tune. In case you are wondering, no, I haven't caught anything yet!

Livestock:

36 acres of grass were duly cut for silage in early June and 276 big round bales of quality winter feed were baled, wrapped in plastic to seal them and carefully moved back to the farm and stacked. Fertiliser was spread on the short grass sword and then it rained (lovely) and rained (OK) and rained (not so lovely!) Then the sun shone (lovely). This has resulted in massive grass growth across all of the grass fields. So much grass in fact that when checking the stock today I had trouble finding some of the calves who were playing hide and seek!

The latest embryo transfer flush resulted in a disappointing 5 fertile embryos, these were all implanted into waiting recipient cows, we hope for a conception rate of over 50%. The next flush of 3 pedigree British Blue cows is planned for two weeks time, and 15 recipient cows will be awaiting embryos so we hope for a better result then.

The lambs have continued to grow well and were weaned this week. Although both ewes and lambs do make a fuss for a couple of days when we separate them, they soon settle. The lambs are put onto quality short grass while the mums are dried off on poorer grazing. The best 15 ewe lambs will be retained for breeding, the next best 10 or so will be sold for breeding while the poorer end and any with genetic faults will be sold through Colchester market for meat. Only one ram lamb (the best) will be retained for breeding use in the flock, and a further 30 will be carried through to next year to be sold at 18months of age. Meanwhile last year's male lambs, which have now been sheared, are almost ready to be sold to new homes for breeding.



Please remember to keep dogs under close control and to clean up after them.

BABERGH DISTRICT COUNCIL

It has been a few months since I have submitted an article to the newsletter. With the Council being in Purdah due to the County Council elections things have been relatively quiet. However, with the elections over things are starting to pick up again as we move into the Summer.

One big change is the return to face-to-face meetings. While there are a number of advantages to remote meetings, both in terms of less time spent travelling and the obvious environmental benefits, it is good to actually see people in the flesh again. Going forward though, a lot of our working parties and briefings will remain online while formal committee and Council meetings will be completed in Endeavour House, under strict Covid guidelines.

There are a number of Working parties starting over the summer to review and respond to public consultations. The Recycling and Waste Strategy element of the Environment Bill is currently out to public consultation and a working party of officers and Councillors has been drawn together to consider the proposals in this strategy. Similarly a working party is also due to start in July to look at establishing a Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) for the Districts. You will be aware that the public consultation to develop an evidence base using the "commonplace" tool is already underway with a brilliant response to date from our communities.

CIFCO

This summer the Council will also review the CIFCO annual business plan. While the property investment company have brought in more than $\pounds_{5.4}$ m to help fund services and projects for residents in Babergh and Mid Suffolk, the strategy of borrowing to generate income is

still controversial and does not garner unanimous approval. Both Babergh and Mid Suffolk Greens have been particularly outspoken on this topic.

Putting the Councils in to debt to get a return may be seen to be working, but it is not without risk. CIFCO have already had to wipe off £240,000 in debt from unpaid rent. This concern is shared by the Government who have now banned this type of income generation for Local Authorities.

Virtual High Street

Over 100 new businesses have signed up to the Virtual High Street as the site launches in Hadleigh and Stowmarket, joining over 130 already signed up to the platform in Sudbury. Shoppers can benefit from even more ways to shop local at a range of high street stores, independent retailers and market stalls, as well as cafes and restaurants. Customers will be able to visit their local shops online to browse stock, place orders and arrange click and collect or a delivery from home or on the move.

The aim of the Virtual High Street is to bring the local high street and market stalls into the homes of customers before they visit the high street in person, making shopping local and supporting local businesses even easier.

For residents in Hadleigh, over 55 businesses including Ferguson's Delicatessen, Cobbler Café and Wine Bar, Andrew's Quality Butchers and EriVica Cakes are all signed up as well as accommodation providers such as Holbeck House B&B and The Gables B&B.

Locality Award Fund

Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils' have again made money available for Locality Awards funding – enabling communities to improve facilities, learn new skills and work towards becoming environmentally sustainable.

Babergh have provided each Councillor with £2000 to support the villages in their wards.

Ensuring that no resident is left feeling lonely or excluded remains of great importance for both councils, and Locality Awards grants can be used towards combating this in communities by installing hearing loops, providing Wi-Fi in rural areas, or hosting coffee mornings or lunch clubs.

Groups can also apply for funding for sports and play equipment, exercise classes, walking festivals and other initiatives which support the councils' aim for communities to lead active lives and manage their own health and wellbeing.

Applications are also welcome for providing medical skills such as first aid to communities, as well as supporting them in other training including safeguarding, fire safety and antisocial behaviour prevention.


