PRIDE IN OUR PARISH

In early April, we held the Kersey Annual Parish Meeting, by Zoom. It was a reminder of how astonishingly resilient and resourceful Kersey residents have been in such a challenging year.

We are a small community of 350 people with many family, informal and social networks and businesses. In addition, remarkably, we also have 23 charity and community groups who have pulled together to help others in our Parish. We can be proud of what was achieved while facing the pandemic.

We should be proud that we were one of the first communities in the country to establish a team of volunteers in direct response to COVID-19. We have 24 members from all areas of Kersey helping with shopping, collecting prescriptions and providing practical support, not least with a friendly telephone contact.

The Kersey Volunteer Group and the Footpath Working Group continued keeping our roads, footpaths and bridleways litter free and usable so that we can enjoy the countryside again. The Nightingale Trust has provided access to a Community Car Scheme to help those who need to attend the surgery or hospital.

Although unable to operate as usual, our local charities and groups have supported people by donations, offering advice and upgrading facilities in readiness for the lifting of restrictions. One good example of this, is the successful effort to secure funding from several donors to enable work to start on the children's playground.

The Reverend Jackson's regular Zoom messages, kept us in touch, with positive, creative messages providing comfort to many.

On behalf of Kersey Parish Council, I thank everyone who has contributed to the wellbeing of our community. We would also like to encourage anyone with the time and energy – especially younger people – to take a more active role in Kersey life. If you wish to join any of our working groups, please contact Sarah Partridge, the Parish Clerk or me.

We have a strong community spirit and are fortunate to live in beautiful surroundings.

There is every reason to feel 'Pride in Our Parish'.

FARMING NOTES

Arable:

Our weather pattern is definitely changing! Surely we have two new firsts for April – longest run of consecutive night frosts and driest April? Since completing the sowing of the last of our spring barley and the sugar beet around the first of the month we have had relentless night frosts and virtually no rain. As well as holding back all of our crops and grass, I think these two phenomena are now beginning to affect tree and hedgerow growth and I am sure most gardeners will have noticed the conditions. Most of our winter crops were not sowed into very good seedbeds in the autumn and are now suffering from the above mentioned conditions. The one exception for us is our Oil Seed Rape which is fully on flower and doing remarkably well. This is mostly due to the current drilling machinery employed that plants the seed along with a small amount of fertiliser above a subsoiled area that allows good root establishment and penetration. Helped greatly by the rain we had immediately post drilling in the middle of the second week of August 2020. Even this though will eventually run out of moisture and yield will be affected.

Most villagers will be aware that we have a film crew working on the Magpie Murders, but perhaps not that we have housed the props department in our grain store! We also have lots of vehicles using our farmyard for parking. The props people have had a large number of deliveries and I would like to apologise to my neighbours for the many miss-deliveries although we did our best to avoid them.

Livestock:

Despite the very cold nights through most of April there is no doubt that spring is here: lambing is completed and with only 2 cows left to calve all of the sheep and most of the breeding cattle have been turned out to grass. A steady rain and warmer nights would be very welcome as this would increase grass growth to keep up with the many (300+) hungry mouths which are devouring it.

Cattle numbers on the farm peaked recently just shy of 200 head, as most of the new calves had arrived while last year's were still on the farm. Having grown very well during the winter we have now started selling last season's calf crop aged 12 to 15 months, as finished animals. As previously mentioned the trade for beef and lamb is strong at the moment and the first ones sold through Colchester Market have not disappointed.

The premier national sale of Pedigree British Blue cattle is always on the third Saturday in May in Carlisle. In normal times this always clashes with the Hadleigh Show and therefore we have never been to the sale. So this year, one small positive of the show being cancelled is that Sarah and I can take a couple of bulls to the sale.

It was lovely to have our university students David and Josie home over the Easter break. They both enjoy life on the farm; David helps with lots of things while Josie is great with the bottle lambs, she loves spending time with them, naming them and has a particular skill of being able to feed 5 lambs at one time! ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

The annual parish assembly was held via Zoom on the 12th April. Present were chair John Hume, five councillors, clerk, county and district councillors and nine members of the public.

Apologies were received from eight people.

Minutes of the 2019 assembly were confirmed as correct. Due to Covid 19 there was not one held in 2020.

Reports -

Suffolk County Council – Robert Lindsay: During this most challenging of years he was pleased to be able to continue to represent the people. His party was part of the political group which put forward an amendment on floods; Four motions were proposed to oppose Sizewell C; Reduction from 30mph to 20mph in certain areas; New biodiversity strategy and increased support for paid and unpaid carers. The group had previously proposed an increase in social worker pay; Five year cycling plan for Suffolk and climate emergency recommendations. From his Babergh awards budget he contributed to the Bildeston Food bank. There is a new school transport provider. Number plate recognition cameras are to be purchased. These will be used in villages where there are speeding issues.

District Council – Leigh Jamieson: During the last year Babergh council have been working with other local authorities to ensure communities have received the support they need. One of the main changes has been the move to virtual meetings.

Planning: The controversial application for seven properties in The Street was approved. The joint local plan has been finalised. The council has enough approved developments for 6.75 years. The Angel Court development in Hadleigh should be completed by June.

CIL funding has been awarded to help many projects across the district. On the Environment and Biodiversity the council's fleet of vehicles are switching from diesel to Hydrogenated Vegetable Oil. Further CO2 savings should come from solar panels and air source heat pumps being installed on council owned sites. A cycle motion was approved as lockdown has seen an increase in the number of cyclists. Also discussed has been the budget, car parking charges and Bell Vue House in Sudbury.

Kersey Parish Council – John Hume: This year had presented many challenges but the community had responded well. The council aim to represent the best interests of the residents. The footpath map has been updated and republished. Thirteen planning applications were discussed eleven of which were supported by councillors. Regrettably the application for dwellings behind 1-6 The Street was approved by Babergh. This caused lack of confidence and distrust in the planning and legal process.

The Emergency plan was finalised. Despite many complaints no action has been taken to improve safety at The Crossroads although the landowner has improved visibility to the south. Since April 2020 all council meetings have been held via Zoom. This has

worked well. A system of volunteers was set up to help with shopping, offer practical support and be a friendly contact. KVG were reallocated areas of responsibility. The council were saddened to note the deaths of four local residents long associated with the Parish Council. He thanked councillors, clerk and everyone who had contributed to the well being of the community during a difficult year.

Footpath Working Group – Kevin Pratt: An exceptional year for the group with many challenges. The very wet weather resulted in the paths being heavily worn but members continued to cut and maintain them. Some posts and signs were repaired or replaced. With the easing of lockdown there is expected to be an increase in walkers who I trust will enjoy walking in the beautiful Kersey countryside.

A member of the public reported overhanging branches on a footpath. A new footpath walking group was a welcome initiative to help people become familiar with the paths.

KCPC – Jonathan Marsh: Due to Covid the grass cutting rota was abandoned but kept maintained by the committee. No fundraising took place. It is hoped work will start in the next month or so on the refurbishment. He was grateful to the parish clerk who had helped to secure grants. The cricket net has seen more use and is very popular with some dedicated individuals. The mower continues to work well.

Kersey Volunteer Group (KVG) – John Hume: This group was launched in 2020 with eighteen volunteers. All were allocated an area in which to collect litter, report potholes etc. Thank you to all on the KVG for their contributions.

Art Group: This popular group was no longer taking place, it was hoped something could be resolved so that it could start again.

Forget Me Nots – Veronica Partridge: The group have been unable to meet for a long time but most members remain in good health. We are looking forward to greeting our friends over a cup of coffee soon.

Franey Rand and Pest House Charities – Rachael Rogers: Although trustees have been unable to meet several grants were made over the year to individuals and groups. The charity has proposed a road be named after it on a new development in Hadleigh. They are awaiting a reply.

Friends of the Bells – Neville Whittle: A quiet year, their last practice being March 2020. Bells have been rung for three services maintaining social distancing. Ringing should resume at the end of June. It was commented on that the bells have been missed and that parishioners were looking forward to hearing them again.

Friends of St Mary's – Mark Rigby: This is the second year since the trust was founded. Due to Covid 19 there were no events last year. They have set up a membership process for "Friends" to join the trust and a 500 club. They have contributed to works on the west door and the bell tower.

Grays Trust – Philippa Harris: The purpose of the trust is to promote education of residents of Kersey. During the year seventeen individuals have been helped. A donation was made to Kersey school and five school leavers were given a leaving present.

Kersey School – Jess Damant: We were very fortunate to have set on line provision during the first lockdown so were able to begin the Spring term with confidence and strength in our remote learning but it has been a real joy to have all the pupils back in school. We held a well received sports week which enabled children to take part in climbing, archery, fencing and yoga. They also learnt about Space and were able to watch a live streamed performance of Jack and the Beanstalk from the New Wolsey theatre. The school nativity was recorded so families were able to watch at home. We have a new Interim Executive Board of Governors. We hope they will move forward with plans to join the Tilian partnership of schools. The Friends continue to support the school thinking of new ways to fundraise. The school is very aware of the involvement in the community through shared venues and facilities without which they would struggle to fully function. We thank them for their continued support.

Kersey Playing Field Association – Mark Pertwee: We have been lucky to have the benefit of the Glebe as a large open space that we have been able to utilise despite the rules. Funding has been secured for repairs to the pedestrian gate posts and fence into the field. We are grateful to the KCPC for their ongoing maintenance on the areas they lease and to Suffolk CC for the grass cutting.

Kersey Projects – Suzie Rudkin: A frustrating year with planned functions curtailed in the light of the pandemic. We were still able to supply, erect and decorate a Christmas tree which did give much cheer.

Lewis Mowles Trust – Norah Orriss: No expenses over the past year and the only income came from some interest.

Millennium Book Fund: The council agreed to spend the majority of the funds on the playground improvement project.

Neighbourhood Watch: There is a vacancy for a co-ordinator.

Nightingale Trust – Mark Rigby: The trustees have ensured the smooth running of the allotments and charitable work during this difficult year. The twenty six allotments are all let and there is a waiting list. Those in need were supported and a contribution was made to the local food bank. Kersey taxi service was started in conjunction with Boxford and Hadleigh community car scheme service providing safe and reliable transport for medical appointments.

St Mary's Church – Linda Newbigging: The year started with the re-dedication of The Shrine. Plans to use the space for local artists was thwarted due to the pandemic. Rev. Jackson took on the challenge of on-line services which proved very popular and reached a far wider audience than expected. All fund raising events were cancelled except the gift fayre in December which raised much needed funds. Grateful thanks were expressed to all the volunteers who help in anyway. The shrine has continued to be a focus of support and comfort to visitors who take the opportunity to sit in a beautiful place. We have places on the PCC if you feel able to help us secure a long and loving future for our worship and building or by just helping out behind the scenes.

Table Tennis – Adrian Blyth: The club only met during a six week period in 2020 following all the guidelines for a small club. It could start up again in May. They meet in the Village Hall on Thursday evenings 7.30-9.00 The purpose is social and recreational. All abilities are welcome.

Tuesday Club – Rachel Wells: Members only met once last year when we enjoyed a talk on "A Holiday in Central Asia". The club continues to support Tilly at The Shelley Riding School.

Village Hall – Veronica Partridge: A very quiet year with hardly any use. The exterior of the hall was painted, the flat roof re-felted and other minor repairs done. We look forward to being able to return to all the activities that have been halted.

Village Produce Association – Rachel Wells: Marquee bookings were very low with only three lets. The outing and the flower show were cancelled. We hope to hold the show this year on the 11th September using last year's schedule.

AOB: There is a Kersey events calendar on the website.

The chair ended the meeting by commenting on the last year. He said Kersey is served well by more than twenty voluntary and charitable groups something to be proud of for a small village.

Boutells – Work to trees. The application was for felling of one and crown reduction on a second. Councillors fully supported this work.

1 Ancient Houses – This was a revised scheme for internal alterations and renovation. Councillors fully supported.

Content for newsletter article "Pride in your Parish" was agreed.

AOB: The broken manhole cover at The Row had been repaired.

Face to face meetings may be allowed from mid May. If legislation allows remote meetings to continue councillors would support this.
