
GLORIOUS WEATHER FOR THE 7th TYE BBQ

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PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on the 6th September.

Present were chairman John Hume, three councillors, clerk. Four members of the public and Babergh councillor attended for part of the meeting.

Apologies were received from three councillors, one member of the public and the County councillor.

Accept members declarations of interest.

The chairman declared an interest in a planning application.

Reports:

County councillor Robert Lindsay's report included Suffolk Climate Emergency plan, Devolution for Suffolk without need for unitaries, Suffolk policy development panel and potholes, verges and hedges. He has been asked to chase up on potholes and verges in the parish. Potholes should be repaired within six months of being reported. No through roads in the village were cut by SCC contractors and local farmers have had to do it. He will try and ensure this doesn't happen again as it isn't the first time they haven't been done. There is also lack of verge cutting in Wicker Street Green which could be because of overgrown hedges.

District councillor Leigh Jamieson: An application for a gas fired power station in Sudbury has been rejected by the planning committee. Former Angel Court in Hadleigh has been converted into twenty one new homes. He also reported on Devolution, Afghan refugees, Local Energy showcase for green businesses and Babergh agreeing funding to identify wildlife corridors.

Parish Time: Three residents present raised concerns about nuisance parking in Church hill and The Street. The problems are caused by visitors, holiday let visitors, residents and trades people.

There has been some near misses and narrowing of the road preventing cars and larger vehicles getting through. Ideas put forward were a car park, signage, yellow lines, bollards and better communication with residents.

Consider solutions to nuisance car parking.

Councillors acknowledge there is a problem but a solution would not easily be found in a medieval village with limited off road parking. Some problems were contrary to the Highway Code such as parking near corners, junctions and parking on pavements. A letter will be sent to residents and owners of holiday let properties asking them not to park where it would cause a danger or nuisance and to use off road parking if they have some. It was agreed a Parish Assembly should be called sometime in October so all residents are given a chance to discuss the problem.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed and signed as correct.

Clerk's report: A query was raised about the large amount of money proposed to be spent on the entrance to Belle View Park, Sudbury. Leigh Jamieson answered questions.

The clerk has completed the grant monitoring paperwork for Suffolk Community Foundation and Babergh. Volunteers are needed to join a working group to organise events for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. The parish council responded to Babergh regarding their application to join a government pilot project to increase planning publicity.

Correspondence: All correspondence has been circulated to councillors, this included an item from the school about an Apache helicopter landing on the Glebe as part of a project they are doing. Screen Suffolk will be filming in the village for one day on the 30th September.

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A big thank you to everyone for your support. Janet, Wendy and all our lovely staff.

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PARISH COUNCIL (cont.)

Church Hill and the Street will be closed for safety reasons. St Mary's church has written to ask if the Parish Council would contribute to the maintenance of the steps which lead up to the church. These are very worn and uneven.

Finance: All financial items were noted and payments approved.

Confirm date of Internal Audit: The auditor has agreed to complete the audit remotely during October.

Planning: Progress: Babergh have approved application for rear conservatory at Drumnamarg Barn adjacent to Red House Farm.

Variation in conditions and erection of cart lodge. Babergh have approved.

Ayers End, Erection of greenhouse. Councillors fully supported.

Old Vicarage. Application for tree works. Fully supported by councillors.

KCPC: The playground continues to be available for all. It has been moved by volunteers over the summer. A maintenance day is planned for the autumn. It is hoped to hold a quiz night in November. A new gate has been fitted to the playground entrance. Following a recent inspection a few issues have been raised which are being looked into.

Update on the project to support residents to reduce their carbon footprint. The Parish Council is working with Groundwork East to provide community support to encourage residents to reduce their carbon footprint. The focus is on the no or low cost actions people can take. A before and after survey needs to be completed by as many residents as possible. Those without the internet can do the survey over the telephone. A "top tips" postcard is being delivered with the newsletter.

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PARISH COUNCIL (cont.)

Consider areas suggested for planting trees,hedges and wild flowers. Babergh is able to offer free trees and hedgerow plants. They would also like to increase areas where wild flowers are encouraged. Four sites were suggested.

Consider update on the Quiet Lanes proposal. Only the route from Kersey Uplands through to Cox Hill Boxford was suitable to be put forward. This initiative might not go ahead unless more time is given for consultation.

Consider setting up social media communication to engage with residents. It has been suggested that the Parish Council should consider publishing the agenda for meetings on Facebook. There is a public Kersey Facebook group of which a councillor is a member. Once agendas have been published she would post them on the Kersey Facebook page.

Consider replacement of the red warning triangle on Church Hill. After it was stolen a resident asked if the Parish Council would consider a replacement. Contributions have been offered. A purchase will be made once enough funding has been secured.

Arrange clerk's job appraisal and salary review. The chairman will meet with the clerk in October.

Receive report following review of website accessibility. The clerk has carried out a review of the website. Some improvements have been made to ensure as much of the content as possible is accessible.

Pride in our Parish content. It was agreed an article be written on parking.

Training: SALC continues to offer on line training.

AOB: The chair would be writing to thank the Kersey Projects team for organising such an enjoyable Kersey picnic. It was suggested that the Parish Council should consider registering The Bell as an asset of Community Value.

Next meeting 15th November.

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FARMING NOTES

Arable:

(These are the notes from the end of August that missed last month's issue.)

I am quickly compiling these notes late in the evening after another days harvesting of laid barley. We began harvest in late July and after a stop-start period of heavy showers managed to complete the winter barley, which was not up to our usual standard of yield or malting quality, due to the wet winter and the strangely dry April. We are now well into the Spring barley that appears to be a little better quality, but also badly laid (also known as 'lodging'). This makes it much more difficult and slower to harvest and also means the ground beneath the crop remains wet and causes the combine driver much frustration as the cutter bar continually clogs. We have also had more than our share of mechanical issues and had to find a replacement combine harvester at very short notice due to the failure of a 'non wearing part' component that is not available anywhere in Europe until mid-September! I think this is due to Brexit, factories closing for coronavirus and lack of foresight by the parts retailers in this country. It has resulted in us having to take whatever was available which proved to be a larger, faster and better machine that although expensive, may turn out to be a godsend. Now the weather is more settled we hope to complete the rest of the Spring barley fairly soon and move on to the wheat that is now fully ripe. As this is currently standing, with quite short straw the new machine will able to show us its full capacity.

Forward to the present:

Suffice to say the newer hired combine was a great success, but we racked up a large hire fee that would not apply if we bought it, so with a good offer for our older broken machine, that's what we did! Currently after lots of ploughing and cultivating we are in the middle of autumn sowing which so far has gone better than the last two years, and we have also successfully established 165 acres of oil seed rape.

Livestock:

It seems a long time ago (Autumn 2020) that we made the decision to build a new barn at Bridges for storage. Quotes were requested, planning permission gained, site prepared and the building was ordered: an 18m by 30m (almost 5,000 sq ft) galvanised steel framed structure with fibre



cement roof and concrete panels for one wall at the back. Footings went in during March and all was looking good for completion before harvest time. This would be ideal as we could then put straw produced from this year's harvest straight in. It

was not until June (the planned month of delivery) that we were contacted by the building company who were sorry to say that due to covid related shortages and corresponding price increases they had not started fabrication and would not be able to honour their quote, and could we pay an extra 10% please? They also needed the building paying for in full before delivery. This made us a little nervous so I was relieved when eventually 3 big lorries finally delivered the roof, the steelwork and the 15 six metre long concrete panels. After further frustration and delay eventually 2 very able hardworking Romanian gentlemen arrived and said 'no problem' and lo and behold! The new barn was up and running within 7 days! When they left the farm my new Romanian friends left their high lift 'cherry picker' platform behind awaiting collection by a low loader. We quickly made use of this for a number of jobs including taking some aerial photos.

We recently made an effort to increase the clover content of some of our grazing fields. Clover has the smallest seed of any farm plant which I can think of. 10kg of clover seed was purchased and I spread these tiny seeds with a spinner on the back of the quad bike over about 20 acres of grassland (meadows and silage aftermath). The idea was that these seeds would germinate during the summer helped by the warm rains. After some seed counting and weighing on very sensitive scales by our resident Chemistry graduate (David) along with a quick back of an envelope calculation he advised me that I had spread about 20 million seeds in 2 hours. Here's hoping that at least some of them germinate and survive. A high clover content in grazing is beneficial in a number of ways: clover is higher in protein than grass; it catches (or fixes) its own nitrogen from the air (saving on artificial fertiliser) and the cows and sheep love eating it!
