QUIET LANES SCHEME

You may have noticed in the local press that Suffolk County Council are providing funding to enable lanes within Suffolk to be designated as Quiet Lanes. The Quiet Lanes Scheme is to alert all road users (walkers, cyclists, horse riders and car drivers) that you are sharing the road with others and to encourage considerate use of the road. The idea is for the "Quiet Lanes' to become safer and more peaceful for all to use and enjoy. "Quiet Lanes' will have signs to alert users to the fact that they are entering a 'Quiet Lane' and to modify their behaviour to accommodate others

The parish council have looked into this scheme and found that the appropriate road within Kersey is the section between Cox Hill (through Wickerstreet Green) and the junction with Hall Road and Williams Green at Kersey Upland. Costs are supposed to be low, pending further investigation and signage will hopefully be relatively discreet yet appropriate. The benefits of the Quiet Lanes scheme can be found on the above link, but there is evidence that this scheme works to reduce speeds and accidents on rural roads.

Be A Good Neighbour...

Parish Councillors are often asked for advice and there are two current issues that seem to be causing bother. Both are resolved by being well mannered and considerate.

The first is **Bonfires**. The law allows us to have a bonfire in our garden. However, it can be a nuisance when the smoke drifts onto a road or someone else's house and garden, especially when the washing has just been put on the line. It is not fair on others to have a bonfire every week, especially when burning wet garden waste. It is also good practice to only light bonfires when the wind is blowing away from houses, and not next to a building, a wooden fence or garden hut – especially in a village like ours with so many thatched properties. It is tempting to get a smouldering fire going by throwing petrol on it – not a good idea – I did it once, many years ago and was lucky to get away with just a singed pair of gardening boots.

The second is **Dogs**. Our canine companions are a great comfort and fun. Most owners are responsible but there are a few legal and good practice basics to remember.

- All dogs must by law, when out in public, have a collar and ID tag with the owner's name, address and postcode.
- Since 2016, dogs must also be microchipped by the time they are eight weeks old.
- Dogs in public places must be 'under control', which means close to you and preferably on a lead, especially when near livestock.
- There are several laws on dog fouling and the reasons are obvious.
- All dogs bark but it can be a nuisance for others if excessive or at unsocial hours. If you are out at work all day you may not even be aware there is a problem.
- \bullet You may love your dog but do remember they may be unintentionally scary to some people and other dogs !

So, with bonfires and dogs, please be considerate to others.

So many impossible tasks and ideas have become possible in the last few decades, so would it be impossible to reduce the amount of plastic we use in our lives? If we all made up our minds to eliminate as much single use plastic as we possibly can, surely it would make a difference? We have been blessed with such a wonderful and diverse world, so beautiful in parts, awe-inspiring in others, so why wreck it with our unnecessary plastics? Why do we need apples and parsnips wrapped in it, why is black plastic still being used for plant pots and food containers, why are products still being double and triple wrapped in plastic and cling film? CLIMATE CHANGE

The Parish Council is working with Groundwork East and the Suffolk Climate Change Partnership to help reduce Kersey's carbon footprint.

The estimate is that if every household in Kersey made five simple changes we could, in one year, reduce our carbon footprint by 200 tonnes CO2. That is the equivalent of 63 return flights from London to Perth, Australia and, in achieving that, each household could also be saving an annual average of £140 on utility bills.

Groundwork East ask that each household completes a brief survey. The survey is a series of questions which merely need tick box answers and will take only five minutes to complete. It can be completed on line at https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/greensuffolkbefore or by telephone on 07720 098980. No personal information is required other than the first line of your address. There will be another survey in four months' time to discover whether or not being more informed about energy use has resulted in any changes.

Groundwork East have given us 12 information sheets on various ways to save energy, including a list of No Cost Actions, a Draught Proofing Advice Sheet and a Water Saving Advice Sheet. All the advice sheets are available on the village website. They have also provided a dedicated energy advisor who can answer individual questions and give impartial advice. Her name is Sarah Gill and she can be contacted on 07720 098980 or sarah.gill@groundwork.org.uk.

The news recently has been filled with accounts of floods and fires which have resulted in loss of lives and homes and which scientists believe are caused by climate change. Turning off one's lights more often seems a tiny response to a global disaster but, done by enough people, it can count.

Kersey Parish Council

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PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on the 5th July.

Present was chairman John Hume, five councillors, clerk and three members of the public. County councillor Robert Lindsay attended for part of the meeting.

Apologies were received from one councillor, one member of the public and the District councillor.

Reports: Robert Lindsay County Councillor. He was re-elected in May along with eight other Green councillors making them the main opposition group to the Conservatives. He thanks all those who supported him. The Greens have joined forces with the Lib Dems and Independent councillors to make a fifteen strong group. He has been appointed deputy leader for the first year. The first meeting in May took place at Wherstead park the only venue large enough. The July meeting was cancelled and it is hoped restrictions will have been lifted and an extra meeting held in September and a venue found.

The cabinet has been re-shuffled and new roles created.

He recently attended a very positive meeting at the school with parents and the new Interim Executive Board. It has applied to join the Tilian multi academy trust and the chief executive of the Trust was also at the meeting. He spoke about his desire to keep the school open and flourishing as did SCC senior education officer. The issue of a sign for the school on the A 1141 continues.

He also reported on school travel and split villages and split siblings, Special Educational Needs review and Bus Back Better.

Leigh Jamieson District Councillor. He had sent a report. Over 100 new businesses have signed up to the Virtual High Street. This allows shoppers to shop local at a range of high st. stores, independent retailers, cafes and restaurants. Customers will be able to visit these places on line and place orders. In Hadleigh over 55 businesses have joined.

Joint Local Plan Examination: This will now take place in September and mid autumn.

Belle Vue Park entrance: The future of Bell Vue Park in Sudbury is on the agenda for this month. The cabinet accepted a bid to turn the house and swimming pool area into retirement homes. The bid will give the council £1. 2m for the park entrance.

The council will review the **CIFCO** annual business plan. While the property investment company have brought in over £5m to help fund services and projects in Babergh and Mid Suffolk the strategy of borrowing to generate income is controversial.

Locality Award Fund: Money has been made available for each councillor to support villages in their wards. Applications are welcomed for a number of initiatives.

A question was raised about the cost of the proposed entrance at Bell Vue Park.

Parish time: A concern had been raised about bonfires. Be considerate to neighbours, consider the wind direction, weather and time of day when starting a bonfire. Concerns were also raised about the long verges making junctions and bends dangerous. Also there are many potholes around the parish which need filling. A suggestion for the Platinum Jubilee celebration in 2022 was for another street party.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed as correct.

Clerk's report: The clerk has responded to Power Networks consultation and the Government remote meetings call for evidence. She had contacted the County councillor

regarding uncut verges and the amount of potholes awaiting repair. He would follow this up. Babergh are keen to improve biodiversity in the district and are working to find spaces for new trees, hedgerows and wild flowers. The Parish Council would welcome ideas for suitable areas in Kersey. Some locations have already been put forward.

Correspondence: The following had been circulated to all councillors. Boundary Commission Review of parliamentary constituencies, Babergh Active travel consultation, Suffolk Climate Change partnership, Babergh local plan and Develop Skills in Health and Social Care.

Finance: Accounts and financial statement had been circulated. All payments were approved. The year end accounts have been published on the website.

Planning: Progress. Leys House. Erection of single storey rear side extension, Erection of home office with guest accommodation. Babergh granted permission with conditions of a green roof system for the home office and a restriction that the guest accommodation cannot be used as a separate household and the office for commercial use. These conditions meet some concerns raised by the Parish Council.

Curtis Farm, Wickerstreet Green. Babergh had granted permission for a garden room and installation of French doors.

Planning application for Drumnamarg, The Tye. Councillors fully supported an application for a rear extension following demolition of existing conservatory. This would modernise the property and make it watertight.

Footpath Working Group: No problems with the paths except the weather had created significant growth. Volunteers have been working hard to carry out surface clearance work. A more robust strimmer may be needed.

KCPC Group members are mowing the grass and carrying out safety checks. It is hoped to hold the quiz night in November subject to demand.

Update on Playground Improvement Project. The new basket swing has been installed and is being enjoyed by the children. Repairs have been done to the climbing frame. The playground gate has been replaced and gate posts replaced at the pedestrian entrance to the playing field.

After a professional inspection had been carried out a few minor risks were highlighted. Noted was the long grass on the slide mound. This had been left on purpose to encourage biodiversity.

Update on **Quiet Lanes** proposal. After a discussion with the quiet lanes team it was thought that the proposed route could be extended to include Church Hill, The Street to the A1141 Crossroads. This would then link with a proposed route in Aldham. Another thought was to make all the roads in Kersey quiet lanes. This would depend on number of signs and costs. Public consultation will be necessary, through a public meeting, leaflet drop to households as well as the newsletter.

Consider ideas for a community event to celebrate the **Queens Platinum Jubilee**. There will be an extended bank holiday in June when it is hoped communities will come together to celebrate. A working group to be formed to organise events. It should be something that involves the whole community.

Review **Parish Council Asset Register**, report on physical inspection of assets and insurance cover and a review of the fidelity guarantee. All assets had been checked and were in good order. Some of the older timber street furniture is beginning to show signs of age but are OK at the moment and will be kept monitored. It was agreed to add the junction warning sign on Church Hill as an asset.

Consider any actions necessary due to **COVID 19. Community support** remains in place.

Agree content for **Pride in our Parish**. The chair will write an article about being good neighbours with regard to dogs and bonfires. There had been complaints about noisy dogs disturbing people and out of control dogs running through gardens. There have also been complaints about smoke from bonfires causing a nuisance.

Training: On line training is available.

Meeting: SALC Babergh Area Forum via Zoom. Notes have been circulated to councillors.

AOB: Councillors were concerned about road signs being obscured by vegetation. The clerk will contact Robert Lindsay.

Next meeting 6th September.

EXTRAORDINARY MEETING OF THE PARISH COUNCIL.

An extraordinary meeting of the Parish Council was held on the 2nd of August.

Present were Chairman John Hume, three councillors and clerk.

One councillor was absent with apologies being received from two councillors and two members of the public.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed as correct.

Planning: Barn adjacent to Red House Farm, Wickerstreet Green. Variation of approved plans. Cart lodge to be relocated and size amended to allow for home office. Roof to be raised to achieve head height. After much consideration it was resolved to object to this proposal due to concerns on height and size of cart lodge. If the planning authority approve this application the parish council would like to see a condition restricting the use of the cart

The next issue will cover October 2021.

lodge so it cannot be used for residential accommodation.

Kersey Mill. Proposal for construction of workshop, erection of domestic garage and domestic outbuilding. There were some proposed conditions from Highways, Environmental Health & Heritage. After discussion it was agreed to support the application though there were some concerns about development at the site. The Parish Council would not like to see any further development in this location.

AOB: It was commented that some Parish councils use social media to publicise meetings. The younger generation tend to use Facebook. This to be considered at next meeting. A question was asked about the idea of setting up a parish email advert to keep residents informed on things such as flooding. It was decided not to pursue this. The emergency plan has a protocol to follow & residents are encouraged to sign up to government flood alerts from the Environment Agency. Councillors were concerned about the many pot holes which have still not been repaired. Also the no through roads have been missed by the cutting contractors again, county councillor to be contacted. A tree has fallen across the verge on the double bend near Williams Green. The chair will report to SCC. Residents in Vale Lane have raised concerns about the lack of grass cutting outside the houses. It has been suggested that the two main areas should be mown and the rest left for wildlife/wild flowers. Some residents had not understood the role of the COVID 19 volunteers. These volunteers are happy to help support residents but it is up to the residents to ask for help.

A Zoom meeting is being set up to take forward the community support to help residents reduce their carbon footprint. Two councillors agreed to try and join this meeting.
