### FARMING NOTES

#### Sheep Special!

To mark the 95th anniversary of the Kersey flock this month's article will feature on Suffolk Sheep.

Suffolk Sheep as a breed were developed by crossing Southdown rams on the native Norfolk Horn ewe as far back as 18th Century. This cross combined the growth and mothering abilities of the Norfolk Horn with the fine wool and fleshing of the Southdown. This crossbred was then improved by selective breeding until the hornless black faced sheep that we now recognise as a Suffolk became a pure breed. The breed society of Suffolk Sheep was established in 1887 in Ipswich. Suffolk Sheep have continued to develop and improve over the past 150 years to become the leading native terminal sire in the UK.



Historically much of the wealth of Kersey and the area came from sheep's wool and the textile industry. Sadly however, modern synthetic materials have replaced this and the wool is currently of very little value. The shorn fleece of a Suffolk Sheep weighs about 2 to 3 kg and is worth less than  $\pounds 1$  per fleece which does not cover the cost of shearing! Since wool is worth so little the Suffolk is now bred entirely to produce meat. Suffolk rams are used on commercial ewes to produce fast growing quality lean lambs for butchers.

The Kersey Flock was established in 1927 by Robert Partridge (known as Bobby) and is now one of the oldest flocks in the country. For many years there were two flocks in the Parish of Kersey after John Partridge, Bobby's nephew, set up the Harts flock in 1947. I took on the running of the Harts flock in 1982 following the death of my father, John. Bobby died in 1980 and in 1999 the opportunity arose for us to combine the two flocks by buying the remaining ewes of the Kersey flock from Roger Partridge, thereby retaining the Kersey prefix.

During the last century Suffolk Sheep have formed part of our mixed farming enterprise, making use of root crops and sugar beet tops as well as other arable by products, thus improving the soil fertility. The importance of this mixed system is once more at the forefront of agricultural practice.

Interestingly the 'Kersey Flock' was not the first flock of Suffolk Sheep in the Parish, the founder of our farming business (R Partridge and Son Ltd) Great Great Grandfather, Robert Partridge, had a flock of about 200 Suffolks between 1900 and 1909.

The 'Kersey Flock' is believed to be the fourth oldest in the country. At one time father had in excess of 250 breeding ewes, however with the decline of sheep in general in the Eastern counties our current flock of just over 60 ewes is the largest pedigree flock in the home county of the breed. Over the years we have used various progressive technologies in an attempt to improve the genetics of the breed in order to supply our customers with top quality stock.



In recent years we have been delighted to supply ewes to people starting several new flocks in the Eastern Counties. In 2017 we exported 19 ewes and 2 rams to Portugal. Our breeding rams are sold to commercial and pedigree flocks locally and have also been exported to Germany and France.

#### Party like it's 2020 again

The Bishop has been nagging me for two weeks to get my 2021 church statistics report in; I keep telling him I'm waiting for Sue Gray's report first – Ha.ha! The best jokes I've heard about partygate were all to do with what was on the DJ's playlist at the this-is-totally-a-work-event-not-a-party: "Fight for the right to party"; "No Limits"; "Don't Stand So Close To Me" and my favourite "Fade To Sue Gray".

We are so cynical now about politics, so cynical in fact that I feel seventeen all over again. But I don't think it's a bad thing to be cynical about politics when politicians behave like this. We pray each Sunday in St Mary's for our political leaders and for those who hold them to account. And we are also responsible for holding our government to account. If video did kill the radio star then 24 hour news killed political naivety and it's better that we are informed and aware of our leaders' foibles. So long as we judge them no more harshly than we wish to be judged. And that we remind ourselves of the words of the Lord's Prayer "Forgive me as I forgive others". Ouch. 
#### St Mary's Floodlights

## PARISH COUNCIL

An extraordinary meeting of the Parish Council was held on 6th. December. Present were four councillors and clerk. Apologies were received from two councillors. No applications had been received to fill the vacancy on the council.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed and signed as correct.

**Planning:** Progress. Babergh had granted permission for alterations at River House. To be considered. 1 Hollies cottage, Wickerstreet Green. Re-thatching of roof, construction of three dormer windows and extension to chimney stack to comply with building regulations. Councillors agreed to fully support.

An application for Manor Farm was received too late to be discussed at the meeting this will now be done at a later date.

**AOB:** The nomination of The Bell as an Asset of Community Value has been acknowledged by Babergh and a decision will be made in January.

The dog bin at Wickerstreet Green is well used, it was suggested that perhaps this could be included in the Babergh dog bin scheme.

Concern was raised about the traffic speeding through Wickerstreet Green.

The chair has been in contact with the new tenants at The Bell who have indicated they are willing to join with the Jubilee celebrations.

Councillors have been working with the parking expert on communication and education information.

Next meeting 31st January.

## **KERSEY HEALTH TRAVEL**

#### In conjuction with Hadleigh, Boxford Community Car Scheme

The Nightingale Trust was originally set up in 1875 with a remit to help the poor and needy of Kersey. Times have changed and with them, so have peoples needs. Today, we help those in need with their winter fuel bills, in a small way, and we also make donations to the local food bank in the hope this covers Kersey too. We are always looking for new ways to help each other and those with a genuine need.

To this end, we have managed to include Kersey in the existing **Hadleigh and Boxford Community Car Scheme** which has been running for some years and is organised by Jen Eastwood, a resident in Boxford.

If you are a patient, registered at Hadleigh Health Centre, Boxford Surgery, or Bildeston surgery in need of a lift to medical appointments including Doctors, Consultants, Physiotherapists, Opticians, Dentists etc. we will be happy to help. We have a number of volunteer drivers who are available to take you to your appointment, wait for you and then bring you home. There is a charge of 45p per mile for this service to cover the petrol and depreciation costs which I hope you find acceptable.

For Kersey residents using this service and in genuine need, the Trustees of the Nightingale Trust would like to contribute £5 towards your taxi costs each month to a limit of £20 per year.



## KERSEY THROUGH THE CENTURIES

#### A new and exciting history of Kersey



Your Local History Recorder has been working hard during lockdown. *Kersey Through the Centuries* gives an exciting picture of Kersey life through the ages. Making sense of old documents and records, it follows the peaks and troughs of Kersey life and contains true accounts of fascinating and sometimes gruesome events. Kersey's prosperity peaked in the 15th century at which time a new breed of successful clothiers emerged who became landowners and challenged the aristocratic status quo. Many of the village's beautiful buildings originate from this period, preserved mainly due to the poverty in later centuries which precluded redevelopment.

There are stories of medieval misconduct, religious conflict and changing lords of the manor according to royal whims. The book tracks the fate of Kersey Priory, which was dissolved before the Reformation and reveals the lifestyle of the Augustinian canons who lived there.

In the 1600s, Kersey was the home of a prototype feminist lay preacher and found itself at the centre of puritan migration to America. The son of one of the earliest Kersey emigrants to Massachusetts did not find the promised land though: he was in Salem just at the wrong time and ended up being burnt as a witch.

Then there are sad tales of Kersey folk ending up in the Cosford Workhouse in Semer, from where in the 18th century one young girl escaped, was recaptured and deported to Australia. She was not alone, other Kersey perpetrators of minor crimes also found themselves on prison ships taking them to the other side of the world. A century later, men from Kersey were involved in riots against the cruel regime imposed by Cosford Workhouse.

The book explores the harsh fate of many agricultural labourers who signed up to fight in World War I and examines the impact of World War II on the village. The ups and downs of agriculture are also charted. Taxes and tithes were a constant burden on farmers and business owners through the centuries, with anger against the tithe system reaching boiling point as late as the 1930s when fascist blackshirts tried to take advantage of struggling farmers.

The author is *Yvonne Martin*, a Kersey resident and the Local History Recorder for Kersey. She worked in publishing as an editor and writer for 40 years and has always had a keen interest in history.
