PARISH ASSEMBLY

The annual parish assembly was held on the 11th April.

Present were chairman, seven members of the public, Babergh district councillor and clerk. The chair welcomed those present and thanked them for attending.

Apologies were received and the **Minutes** of previous parish assembly were confirmed as correct.

Reports: County councillor Robert Lindsay. Highways have given the go ahead for a school sign at the bottom of Mill Lane. Suffolk Biodiversity Recommendations were approved in February. The cycling plan for Suffolk is starting to come to fruition. Work desperately needed for planning better bus services has not been done.

District councillor Leigh Jamieson. The council has faced a number of major topics over the last twelve months. Most disappointing was the delay to the Joint Local Plan. The council still has more than the required five year housing land supply. Another big debate is the form of Governance that the council uses, whether it is a cabinet or

committee system. It has been agreed to stay with the cabinet model. The council agreed to an increase in the pay of the senior management team. This will be looked at later in the year. Also reported on was the budget review and environmental which have been put in place. Local walking and cycling infrastructure plan, virtual high street and considerable constructor scheme have been passed. The council has also signed up to become a Council of Sanctuary.

Chair's report: The Parish Council aims to represent the best interests of our 360 residents. He thanked the councillors who had resigned during the year, also the current councillors for their continuing contributions to our community.

Finances remain strong.

During the year the council considered eighteen planning applications of which fifteen were supported.

The council's website access was improved.

Plans were made to go ahead with the Jubilee Street Party supported by a successful application to the National Lottery Community Fund.

In spring 2021 Kersey was the focal point for the filming of Magpie Murders.

There are currently two councillor vacancies and I urge the next generation to take an active role in our community affairs.

On behalf of the Parish Council I thank the clerk for her organisational flair and knowledge and her ability to keep us on track.

Council contacts and the budget can be found on the parish website.

Footpath Working Group: *Kevin Pratt.* Another difficult year the COVID restrictions and some exceptional weather changes created many challenges for the volunteers. Thanks go to all the volunteers and landowners. A number of posts and signs were repaired or replaced.

KCPC. *Jonathan Marsh.* The playground has been available all the year. The new basket swing was installed. The ROSPA report highlighted a number of issues that have been addressed. The gate has been replaced and a new bench installed. The grass cutting rota was maintained and the mower survived another season. Due to COVID rates our quiz night was cancelled. Thank you to all for the support I have received over the past year.

Kersey Volunteer Group: *John Hume.* KVG exists to make Kersey a pleasant, safe and attractive place to work, live and visit. Local volunteers are allocated roads where they collect litter, report potholes and other hazards.

Jubilee Working Group: *John Hume.* The street party is being organised. Entertainment is being provided by Suffolk Concert Band and Border Morris Dancers.

Forget me Nots: *Veronica Partridge*. Activities have resumed with lunch and coffee mornings twice a month. The group travel to several eateries particularly those that have various shops where members can browse.

Franey Rand and Pest House Charities: *Rachael Rogers.* The trust gave grants to individuals and groups including Hadleigh Elderly Peoples Welfare, Shelley Riding for the Disabled and Surviving Winter in Hadleigh which could also benefit people from Kersey.

Friends of the Bells: *Neville Whittle.* Ringing resumed in August. Numbers are low because not all ringers have returned since lockdown. We plan to ring for a wedding in

June and the Jubilee Street Party.

Friends of St Mary's: *Mark Rigby*. The events calendar reopened with an American Supper Dance in December. Further events are planned. One grant was paid to the church during the year.

Grays Trust: *Philippa Harris.* The Grays Trust continues to fulfill its purpose in supporting residents In further education. Eleven university students, two year 12 and 13 students received grants. Leaving presents were given to five leavers at the school a grant was also given to the school itself. A new chairman was elected to take the place of John Robinson who has retired.

Kersey Primary School: Sarah Stirling. The school is now a fully signed up member of the Tilian Academy Trust. Rev. Jackson continues to support the collective worship. During the year they had a visit from a Wattisham based Apache helicopter. There were also trips to the Wolsey theatre, the Science museum in London, Bridges Farm and the School Farm and Country Fair. The school nativity was a live performance held around the farm trail at Hollow Trees. The friends continue to support the school in many ways.

Kersey Playing Field Association: *Mark Pertwee.* The Glebe continues to provide a large open space for village and school use.

Kersey Projects: *Suzie Rudkin.* When restrictions were lifted we hosted a village picnic. A very simple affair but a much needed and enjoyable event.

Lewis Mowles Trust: Norah Orriss. The LM trust had a quiet year with no income or expenses.

Nightingale Trust: *Mark Rigby.* The trust had another good year with all allotments allocated and standards very high. Hedges have been cut back. Winter payments were made to some residents and the local food bank. Transport is available to the doctors or hospital through the Community Taxi Scheme.

St Mary's Church: *Linda Newbigging*. During the year it was clear that keeping our church doors open was an important focus especially for those seeking comfort and peace. Work started on items from the Quinquennial report. The cost of running the church continues to be a focus for the PCC. We benefited greatly from the filming of Magpie Murders.

Table Tennis Club: *Adrian Blyth.* Play started again in September and attendance has been good. The purpose of the club is social and recreational.

Tuesday Club: *Rachel Wells.* Only two meetings were held in 2021. We continue to support Tilly at the Riding School. A full programme has been arranged for this year.

Village Hall: *Veronica Partridge*. Bookings have been resumed after a long stretch of inactivity. The hall and grounds are in excellent order. Still looking at quotes for upgrading the disabled access.

Village Produce Association: *Rachel Wells.* The marquees were let 9 times in 2021. No outing was arranged but the flower show went ahead in September. Donations were made to help newsletter, floodlights and churchyard.

Progress with a solution to nuisance parking in the parish. Action has been agreed. Progress on the Parish Action Plan can be viewed on the website.

AOB: The defibrillator is regularly checked to ensure it is available in an emergency.

The Jubilee

It would be tempting to allow the recent issues with Prince Andrew to colour, or in some way overshadow the upcoming Jubilee. But the Platinum Jubilee is absolutely not a celebration of the Royal Family, it is a celebration of the extraordinary life and service of Queen Elizabeth. Seventy years of faithful service. A Parish Council meeting was held 12th April.

Present were three councillors, the clerk and one member of the public.

Apologies received from one councillor.

Co-option: There are currently two vacancies on the council. One can be filled by co-option.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed and signed as correct.

Planning progress: Babergh had granted permission for swimming pool at Sampsons Hall.

Planning applications to be considered. Erection of agricultural building for storage of plant and machinery on land adjacent to the Grain Store, Cox Hill, Wickerstreet Green. Councillors objected to this plan as do Suffolk Wildlife Trust. Little Pond Barn, Uplands. Erection of a cart house. Councillors supported this application.

Cosford Bridge House, Hadleigh. Conversion of outbuildings to form a holiday let. Councillors supported this.

Bridge House. Erection of shed. It is hoped this can be discussed at next meeting.

AOB: Pride in our Parish content was agreed. An article will be written on road safety and horses.

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FARMING NOTES

Arable

Once again I find myself astonished by the lack of rainfall in April, and hope that making this thought public will result in me being wrong and the heavens will open as you read this! It seems that although the winter crops look well they are beginning to show signs of drought stress and potential yield is being jeopardised, while the spring barley and sugar beet are literally running on empty. As I write these comments it has an all too familiar ring to it as if I've said this before.......

The ongoing theme of rising costs is not improving and the latest figures on Agri-input inflation shows a 23.5% average increase in across the board purchases. Output prices are of course increasing but the marketing decisions are being influenced strongly by extreme volatility and we regularly read in the agricultural press that we are in 'uncharted territory'.

Cattle

I apologise in advance for the morose tone of the following item but things don't always go well and I like to be honest. Last week was a bad week in the calving shed... a very bad week. Things did not start well when on my routine daily round of the recently turned out cows and calves I found a dead calf. One day she was a picture of health, the next stone cold. A post mortem carried out by the vet has as yet proved inconclusive. The good news here is that it appears to be a one-off rather than the beginning of an outbreak of something. Two days later one of our surrogate mums who was carrying a pedigree British Blue calf began to calve, complications led me to call the vet, feeling that a caesarean was prudent, (it was a valuable calf). The vet advised that he thought we could calve the cow naturally, this we attempted, things deteriorated and the calf was stillborn. I am not blaming the vet entirely for this as I am the one with 30 years of experience of these cattle and I could and should have insisted on a C-section, (we try to learn from our mistakes). The next day a Pedigree Blue cow began calving, things progressed as planned and a lovely bull calf was soon delivered with a little help from Sarah and I. A few minutes after delivery however we saw that although initially breathing the calf was struggling and despite our best efforts to keep it going it too died. The

margin between success and failure can be very fine in this job. We console ourselves with the thought that much worse and more serious things are happening in the world, and that we have got lots of lovely healthy calves and I for one am still after all these years always looking forward to the next calving! On a brighter note we sold a young bull to a breeder from Southend recently and while I was out Sarah oversaw the end of lambing, delivering a healthy set of triplets!



Open Day

Thank you to those of you who came to the farm for our open day. It was lovely to see families really enjoying their time on the farm seeing, touching and feeding the animals and learning a little about where their food comes from. This week we will be taking ewes and lambs to the 20th School Farm and Country Fair at the Suffolk Show ground. There will be 3,500 children aged 7–9, including some from Kersey School, all enjoying an educational day out learning about food and farming. We are also looking forward to the Hadleigh Show on 21 May.

BABERGH DISTRICT COUNCIL

Babergh Cabinet Collapse

Just before Easter the "rainbow" cabinet that the administration has been so proud of has collapsed in on itself. After expelling one Independent Councillor from the Cabinet the other three Independents resigned followed by the one Lib Dem councillor. This left the Cabinet in the hands of a minority administration that was not a true democratic representation of our residents.

Only the previous week the Council had voted down a Green party motion to return the council to a more democratic committee based system.

Following a lot of negotiation between the group leaders a new cabinet was agreed. At the time of writing, and the way things are going this could change, the expected make-up of the cabinet for the last year of the council will be four Conservatives, three Independents, one Lib Dem and one Green.

Babergh Senior Manager Pay

In March, the Council agreed to an increase in the pay of the Senior Management team, except the CEO, which we will look at again later this year. Both Babergh and Mid Suffolk councillors approved the increase, which had initially been rejected back in the autumn, after receiving a full explanation that it is only a 2-3% increase and will open the door for a full pay review for all council staff. The increase will now align the council with other district councils in the East.

Councils join forces with GPs to keep residents fit

Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils have expanded their GP referral schemes to include Hadleigh, providing tailored support for residents to improve their health and wellbeing. In partnership with local health partners and the councils' leisure providers – Abbeycroft Leisure and Everyone Active – both councils are continuing to grow the number of GP referral programmes at their leisure centres.

Through the programmes, doctors refer patients with common medical conditions such as obesity, hypertension, or type 2 diabetes, to the councils' local gyms for a programme of tailored exercise over a set period. Once on the road to recovery, patients are then encouraged to continue their rehabilitation and improved health through a longer-term membership.
