A packed congregation gathered at Hintlesham at the end of October to share Rev. Jackson's last service in the Benefice. It was touching and meaningful and laced with beautiful music. We wish Rev. Jackson and his family very well in his new Parish.

This means that our Parish has now gone into Vacancy and the Church Warden is responsible for everything at St Mary's.

We are very lucky that Rachel has already organised some wonderful visiting clergy to help us at our services – and we warmly invite you all to attend from time to time to hear what they have to say to us. It's a great opportunity to experience different styles of preaching and services during this period.

In the meantime, the PCC will begin to work on our Parish Profile; this is the 'job specification' for our next Priest. Each of the other Parishes (Elmsett, Aldham, Hintlesham and Chattisham) will be doing the same and the Parish Profiles will be amalgamated with information about the Benefice and Hadleigh Deanery. This document will be finalised by end of November ready for the official meetings and then the national advert.

Other people from the Diocese are included in the process and the official Section 11 and Section 12 meetings are already in the calendar for 30th November and 23rd January. After those, an advert will be placed, and interviews will be held by 18th April. With a fair wind, we could have a new Priest by May or June.

Now the important bit; and it doesn't matter whether you are a regular church goer or someone who comes every now and then, but the PCC would like your ideas and thoughts regarding the qualities that you would like to see in our next Priest. What would you like him or her to do or to be which would mean that you feel supported over the next few years – we would like you to have your say.



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FARMING NOTES

Arable

All of the autumn seeding (Wheat, Barley and Beans) has now been completed and although rainfall has not been excessive there has been enough moisture to allow all of the crops to germinate. The new tractor/drill combination has worked well and, it and driver Ryan have been in demand to drill some land for our neighbours. In fact, Ryan has drilled a large proportion of the parish of Kersey this autumn. The unseasonably mild autumn has encouraged rapid germination and if you look around you will see the arable fields turning greener day by day. Drilling at the ideal time and into good ground conditions is the first step towards a productive harvest, although there is plenty of time between now and then for weather or other factors to spoil this excellent start!

Livestock

This beautiful open autumn weather has allowed us to leave some of the cows and their calves out at grass for a little longer than average. The cows are happy munching away on straw delivered out to them on a daily basis and the growth rate of the calves is maintained by the creep feed which they can access, meanwhile all are also benefitting from some late grass growth.



I try not to get too attached to our animals but we all have favourites... I was sorry to part with Kersey Kaleidoscope this week. Having fathered over one hundred quality calves for us. At eight years of age I decided it was time to part with him as we have young bulls with arguably better genetics coming through to replace him. People often ask how long a bull will last and although he might have gone on for another 4 or so years the chance of his becoming infertile or developing leg or temperament issues increases with age. There are a limited number of slaughter houses which want to, or can cope with the very heavy carcasses of mature stock bulls and these are nearly all in the North or West of the country. Consequently, I made the decision to take Kaleidoscope to Rugby Market in Warwickshire where there would be more buyers competing for him. This proved to be the case and he sold well, his weight at market being 1192kg. The meat from old cull cows and bulls goes into the food chain but since it is not prime beef it is used for lower quality catering or in pies and as mince.

All of the ewes have now been served by one of the four rams which we are using this year. This can be seen by the presence of raddle marker paint on the rumps of the ewes. Once all the ewes have been marked we change the colour of the paint on the ram and hope that he will not mark them all again, if he does it is bad news for us as it means the ram is infertile, and that is very bad news for the ram!

Households urged to get Food Savvy and plan ahead to save money and avoid waste

As the cost of living continues to bite a new campaign has been launched in Suffolk to help families reduce food waste and save money.

Back To Savvy is a Suffolk Waste Partnership initiative which advises people on how to reduce food waste through planning out meals and storing them effectively.

The campaign will advise on planning meals and batch cooking, storing prepared meals so they are ready for work/school, and repurposing leftovers into new meals.

The three main top tips are:

- 1. Cook today, eat tomorrow cook multiple meals together using batch recipes and store in a fridge or freezer for later
- 2. Love your leftovers turn dinner leftovers into tasty lunches or even remix them into fun new recipes.
- 3. Plan ahead organise your lunches by planning and buying in advance. Even a minute planning your meals will save you a tonne of time and money.

Back to Savvy launches on Monday September 5 and is part of the wider Suffolk and Norfolk Food Savvy campaign, which offers a range of advice and information on how to save food and money. Households across the UK waste 6.6 million tonnes of food annually, of which it is calculated 4.5 million tonnes are good to eat.

In Norfolk and Suffolk, this equates to 118,000 tonnes of wasted food across the two counties annually. The average family with children could save more than £730 per year if they were to reduce their avoidable food waste.

Food waste also contributes to climate change as the greenhouse gases associated with food waste in the UK are the equivalent of those produced by ten million cars.

Councillor James Mallinder, the chair of Suffolk Waste Partnership, said: "Family budgets are under huge pressure, so this is one way of helping ease the financial burden.

"As we head into autumn the cost-of-living crisis will undoubtedly affect many more families and our foodsaving tips will help people to reduce the money they spend on wasted food.

"With a little forethought and planning it is possible to make what we buy go further, last longer and help protect our environment."


Tales of

Hadleigh's

Great War

NIGEL CRISP

This book has been inspired by folk I remember in my childhood in Hadleigh; men who had served in the trenches of the Great War 1914-1918. The research is a continuation of the Royal British Legion's **Hadleigh Great War Centenary Project**. The Bridge Street Boy's School when Alfred W Harriss was headmaster, was the town's unofficial communications' hub for men and families during the Great War. It was where my passion for history was stirred in four years of schooling in the days when William A B Jones was headmaster. So, it is a thrill to launch *Small Town Duty* at the Old School on Remembrance Day, to be able to talk about the book and give a taste of its contents.



There are 400 A4 pages of text, old photographs as well as images of today, both in Hadleigh and on the battle fields. Maps are included and explained to encourage readers to know the places of the fighting and to explore the Western Front; places where Hadleigh men stood and where some still lay.

It was duty to King and Country or more correctly to one's fellow man, that caused men to go to war. More than 800 Hadleigh men served in the military during the Great War. Almost 500 get a mention in the book, many in detail through the tales of their experiences. Hadleigh had 53 soldiers who could claim to be an Old Contemptible and were on the battle fronts in the first months of the conflict. In July 1915, ninety of the town's men went together to Gallipoli and the next month sixteen of them were killed together on one day. In all the major battles through to the end of 1918, Hadleigh was represented; these men served not just on the Western Front in Europe and at Gallipoli and From Siberia to East Africa. There are 112 men remembered on the town's War Memorial, quite a few are remembered elsewhere and many more returned wounded. Hadleigh's last Tommy died in 1985.
