


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ST. MARY'S CHURCH

St Mary's Church Quinquennial Report (QR) 2019

In order to ensure the church is kept in good repair a suitably qualified architect carries out an inspection every five years and a report is handed to the Diocese and the PCC for implementation. Our latest QR was completed in 2019 and handed to the PCC just before the COVID 19 pandemic. The report lists those things that must be done as soon as possible and those things which should to be done over time.

From this very extensive must do list the PCC have initially concentrated on: the roof, the lightning conductor, the external windows, the internal windows, the soakaways, and the electrics.

The main roof load is estimated at 28 tons of lead plus tiles. The roof has a run off into a gulley which contains a number of drain pipes and spouts. Recent problems have occurred when this gulley is blocked by ice or debris. Majority of the gulley can be inspected from the bell tower. Our contractor reported 17 lead patches were required to the end and side rolls plus 6 damaged tiles on the chancel required replacement. This work was completed in May and the next full roof inspection is due in 2027.

The church has one lightning conductor which is tested annually, this comes to earth on the northwest wall and travels to the top of the tower where is splits into eight along the parapets. The 2019 QR stated the conductor tape had come away from the wall on the tower roof parapets. This repair work was completed in March.

The QR highlighted that many of the quarry diamond shaped window tiles were cracked or missing throughout the church. We engaged a Master Glazier who identified 19 broken panes, caused largely by movement in the building. The repair work to the glass and lead was completed in March.

The three severely damaged windows in the chancel and the squint window had appeared on many QRs. In the latest one they moved up to the must do list. All four windows had been cemented in without any lead using 1970s standard plate glass. Small movements in the building led to the inevitable slippage and cracks, which were considered to be dangerous to the public. Three new windows were commissioned using similar glass to the rest of the church ensuring any future movement is managed through the small panes and lead surround. The stonework at the top of each window has also been repaired. We took the opportunity to introduce a small amount of colour and the Queen Elizabeth jubilee dates for posterity. The Squint window opening has been repaired and for the time being left open.

There are a number of areas around the church where the spouts from the roof cascade water below. These soakaways have been dug out over the years and filled with gravel to aid the water flow away from the walls. The last two QRs have stated these old soakaways on the north side are now ineffective and require an overall. This work will be completed before winter.

The QR mentions the electrics. The electrics are subject to an on-going improvement plan and over the past two years old sockets have been replaced and new ones added to the South wall. New efficient lighting has been fitted where possible and the wiring up the spiral staircase to the bell chamber has been checked and improved where necessary.

The total cost of this work to date excluding recoverable VAT is circa £5,000.

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FARMING NOTES

Arable

Well what a summer this is turning out to be! With minimal rainfall over the last 4 months and high temperatures day and night recently, we were very pleasantly surprised by the harvest results. We were not expecting much and were ready to tighten our belts, but are genuinely pleased with what turned out to be good yields for all of our cereals and OSR, especially as we applied 20% less nitrogen fertiliser and no phosphate and potash at all, due to exorbitant prices of these inputs. I think the results are very much a one-off and we would see a serious yield reduction if these cuts are sustained. Other factors that made this harvest a plain sailing operation are the larger combine that we bought after last year's breakdown, and the continuously dry weather and warm nights that allowed us to start harvesting earlier in the mornings than usual and allowed us to go on late into the nights. Indeed it was a record early start to harvest -11th July and by far the earliest finish -3rd August! This has left us plenty of time in which to do the cultivations but we have not progressed well in the dry, hard ground conditions which result in breakages and excessive wearing of tractor tyres and steel tines and points to the ground equipment. We were planning not to plough this year, but to use our new direct drill; however there is still some damage to the soil from previous years to rectify with the sub-soiling cultivator. If we had been ploughing as usual it too would have been fraught with problems, also due to the difficult soil conditions. Only time will tell if we have made the correct decisions.

Livestock

Although farmers have a reputation for talking about the weather, I make no apology this month for what follows... In previous farming notes I commented that cattle and sheep often do well in a dry year due to efficient digestion of dry grass and a reduced threat from the various parasites, (gut worms and coccidiosis) which thrive in warm damp conditions, and this has indeed been the case. The continued dry hot conditions though are now beyond a joke and the worst I have seen in my working lifetime. (I was still at school in 1976.) The recent 10mm of rain which fell onto warm parched ground did very little good. It did trigger a tiny amount of grass growth but every fresh blade of grass is being nibbled off by hungry cows or sheep almost before we can see it! The cows are being sustained by eating rough dry stalky grass which grew earlier in the summer, along with straw from the recent

harvest which I take out to them several times a week. The growth rates of the calves and lambs will be affected, but are being maintained to a degree by the feeding of expensive (£400 a tonne) concentrate feed.

However, farming life goes on. The bulls have now been removed from the cow groups and housed, also 12 more pedigree embryos have been implanted into other cows. We will find out how successful they have been when we pregnancy scan the cows in the autumn. A further eight pedigree British Blue calves are also due to be born soon, the result of embryos implanted last year.

Stock Ram

We need to source at least one new stock ram for the Suffolk flock. Although Suffolk Sheep are very common and found all over the world, when it comes to buying a new ram there are a number of criteria which the ram has to fit: As well as being unrelated to our ewes a new ram must be the right type with good flesh, correct legs and colouring (black head and legs with white wool). We also need our new stock ram to be high health status and performance recorded with exceptional figures for growth and muscle. There is little point buying a new ram which is not better than what we already have. I have done some research and spoken to some breeders. Sarah and I will be travelling to Yorkshire next week in search of the perfect ram!

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PARISH COUNCIL

A Parish Council meeting was held on the 4th July.

Present were John Hume (chair), three councillors and the clerk.

Apologies received from one councillor and Babergh councillor.

Co-option to fill vacancies: There are two vacancies which can be filled by co-option. A third vacancy is being advertised. Residents are being encouraged to consider becoming a parish councillor.

Reports: Suffolk County councillor Robert Lindsay.

Babergh District councillor Leigh Jamieson.

These two reports can be seen on the Parish Council website.

Minutes of the previous meeting were confirmed as correct.

Clerk's report: The clerk had submitted a response to the Babergh survey regarding the UK Shared Prosperity fund. The defibrillator is still not operational. The clerk is working with the Community Heartbeat Trust to get this working again as soon as possible.

Correspondence: All had been circulated to councillors and noted.

Finance: A copy of the accounts had been circulated to councillors for approval. All payments were approved. The clerk confirmed all necessary accounts had been published on the website in accordance with regulations and the Transparency Code.

Planning: Progress. Babergh had granted permission for retention of chicken shed and run at Green Gables.

Footpath Working Group: Report received from Kevin Pratt. The footpath volunteers have been working hard to complete the first cut. Options are being investigated to potentially replace and update some equipment. More volunteers are needed.

KCPC Working Group: Report received from Jonathan Marsh. The playground continues to be used and there were no material defects discovered at the last inspection. A replacement mower is being investigated. The cricket net is showing signs of wear and tear. The grass mowing rota continues to operate well. A quiz night is planned for the 11th November.

Jubilee Working Group: Final report. The street party had been a great success with nearly 300 people attending. The community had come together and helped in many ways. There was a small under spend on the budget this was given to Kersey Projects to offset some of their expenses.

Consider the process for reviewing the Parish Action Plan and developing a new five year plan. The existing Parish Action Plan is out of date. It was agreed the council would work on completing a review over the next twelve months.

Review Parish Council Asset register: All fixed assets had been checked except for the street lights which are due to be upgraded this summer. All repairs needed were noted.

Agree content for Pride in our Parish.

It was agreed to write an article to encourage residents to consider becoming a parish councillor.

Training: SALC continues to offer online training.

Next Parish Council meeting is on the 5th September.
